

HINDU SPEAKS TO RAVINIA WOMEN

Interesting Address Dec. 10 By
Chandra Gooneratne of
Chicago U.

On Dec. 10 at the Ravinia Woman's club, Mr. Chandra Gooneratne, an East Indian student now studying and teaching at Chicago university spoke on various phases of East Indian life as it is expressed in Indian poetry.

Since the children of the 7th and 8th grades of the Ravinia school were invited as guests of the Woman's club, Mr. Gooneratne devoted the first part of his lecture to the relation of the Indian child to his parents.

Reverence Parents

Indian parents are much revered by their children, and the mother-child relationship is so fundamental a conception in Indian life that even God is conceived of as a mother rather than as a father as he is in the occident. Indian child poetry, very beautifully read by the lecturer, exhibits much the same delightful questioning, the same playful importance on the part of the Indian child as of the American child. And Oriental moth-

ers answer just as tenderly and smile as sympathetically as do all the other mothers in the world. There is not however, between Indian children and their parents the same easy comradeship that we, in this country, enjoy.

Religious Thought

After the children were dismissed, Mr. Gooneratne spoke more extensively on some phases of religious thought in India. He regrets that India has not yet learned the dignity of manual labor, but he rejoices that her people do not yet worship material benefits, nor place, as we do, a great significance on the value of earthly things. Human life in Indian philosophy is no more than an incident in the never ending experiences of existence, and death, therefore, is not a fearful thing but a lovely and welcome transition into further life.

Urges Sympathetic Interest

He urged that Americans should approach whatever country they visited with sympathetic interest, rather than with preconceived judgments. Only to the open minded and kindly inquiring, does the true spirit of a people reveal itself. Ghandi is revered and beloved by his countrymen, even though he criticizes them for he criticizes them with affection, and, says Mr. Gooneratne, "They alone have the right to criticize who love."
