The Highland Park Social Service committee wishes to thank all the individuals and organizations who have co-operated so splendidly in furthering the work of relieving the unemployed and needy.

Christmas Cheer

Plans for Christmas cheer to go into the home of every unemployed person in this community are now perfected. Baskets have been promised by 82 individuals or groups, and the number to be furnished by the Social Service committee will be over 100. The H. P. Woman's club has donated the use of the club basement for packing these baskets on Tuesday and Wednesday.
