Ice skating races will be held on the Sunset Park rink, Highland Park, on Sunday, Dec. 28, sponsored by the Highland Park East Park board, Supt. E. M. Laing announces, and preparations are under way for a big event, with many entries and large attendance.

The boys and girls races will be open to residents of Highland Park only. Races for boys and men, 18 years and over, and for girls and women, 16 years and over, will be open to residents of the North Shore. Cups and medals will be awarded following the races.

### For Highland Park Boys

220 yards, 1 lap—Boys under 12 years of age.

440 yards, 2 laps—Boys 12-15 years, inclusive.

One-half mile—Boys 15-18 years, inclusive.

### For Boys and Men

Open to residents of the North Shore. Entry fee 50c.

One and one-half miles—18 years and over.

Relay race, 4 in team, 1 lap each.

### For Highland Park Girls

No fee.

220 yards, 1 lap—Girls under 12 years of age.

440 yards, 2 laps—Girls 12-16 years, inclusive.

### For Girls and Women

Open to residents of the North Shore. Entry fee 50c.

660 yards, 3 laps—Girls 16 years and over.

## N. S. SANITARY BOND ISSUE IS APPROVED

All Communities for It Except Waukegan, North Chicago; Vote in Detail

Approval of the plan of the North Shore Sanitary district for a bond issue of \$1,200,000 to finance erection of three new disposal plants and to build additions to three existing plants was given by the voters of the district in the special election held Saturday last. The vote was 2,123 for the bond issue, and 1,018 against it.

### Start in Spring

Construction of new buildings made possible as a result of this election will be started early next spring, members of the sanitary board have indicated. The board held a meeting Tuesday to authorize preparation of plans, and as soon as these are ready proposals will be asked.

The bond issue was approved by large majorities in most of the communities in which the election was held, with the exception of Waukegan and North Chicago. Waukegan gave a majority of 10 votes against the plan, and North Chicago went against it 346 to 64.

Highland Park gave a majority of 574 in favor of the bond issue, and Zion was for it with a majority of 830. The vote in each community follows:

Highland Park, Yes, 649; No, 75; Ravinia, Yes, 437; No, 26; Highwood, Yes, 174; No, 27; Lake Forest, Yes, 245; No, 77; Lake Bluff, Yes, 42; No, 33; North Chicago, Yes, 64; No, 346; Waukegan, Yes, 383; No, 393; Zion, Yes, 866; No, 36; Winthrop Harbor, Yes, 63; No, 5; totals, Yes, 2,923; No, 1,018.

The vote is said to be the lightest ever cast in the county on a proposition of this magnitude.

The bond issue of \$1,200,000 includes six projects: New treatment plants for Winthrop Harbor, \$38,500; Waukegan, \$736,000; Highland Park, \$160,000, and additional units at the present treatment plants in North Chicago, \$124,500; Lake Forest, \$47,500, and Highwood, \$93,500.
