Removal of Patients to Other States Will Cut Elgin Asylum Costs

A saving of \$16,000 will be effected at the Elgin state hospital for the insane this year by the removal of 53 non-resident patients to institutions in states where they are legal residents. This computation is based on the figure of \$300 as the average annual cost of caring for mental cases.

Removal of non-resident mentally afflicted patients from Illinois state hospitals to the institutions of their own states will result, in 10 years, in a saving of \$1,203,000 to Illinois state funds, figures of the state department of public welfare disclose. Ten years is the average time the patients spend in Illinois state hospitals. Slightly more than 400 have been thus removed from state institutions this
