Report of a recheck made by the U. S. census bureau of populations of cities and towns of Lake county, issued Monday at Washington gives figures for both 1930 and 1920, as follows: Highland Park 12,203 in 1939 and 6, 167 in 1920; Deerfield village, 1,852 in 1930 and 610 in 1920; Highwood, 3,590 in 1930 and 1,446 in 1920. Deerfield township, 16,983 in 1930 and 11,813 in 1920; West Deerfie'd township, 3,084 in 1930 and 1,615 in 1920. Bannockburn village, 186 in 1930; no figures for 1920.
