# BEGIN NEW SANITARY **BOARD PLANTS SOON**

Disposal Works to Be Started First Is Plan

The North Shore Sanitary board, following the bond issue vote Dec. 20 and the subsequent canvass has authorized Pearse, Greeley and Hansen, consulting engineers, to prepare detailed plans for the construction of three sewage disposal plants and the three additions to existing plants.

According to John Oliver, president of the board, construction on the projects will begin as soon as the weather is favorable to outdoor work. The Waukegan and Highland Park since the need is more urgent in those localities.

Mr. Oliver asserted that payment of special assessments for intercepting sewage will not inconvenience the average property owner.

It has been pointed out that special assessments for this particular project would total \$15 for a 50-foot lot, and that the payment of this amount would be made in installments over a period of 10 years. Mr. Oliver anticipates little difficulty from objectors to special assessment proceedings in Waukegan.

The general vote in Waukegan and North Chicago was opposed to the bond issue, but heavy voting in Zion and communities south of Waukegan, carried the election by a majority of
