PLAN MUCH HIGHWAY WORK IN LAKE COUNTY

State to Spend Million and the County \$500,000 During 1931, Prospect

A maximum of \$1,500,000 may be spent on county highways during the summer by the state and the county under its bond issue it was learned today from R. F. Lobdell, county superintendent of highways, who is planning for the spring construction season. Such expenditure on road work would help to relieve unemployment to a great degree, it is believed.

The official along with county supervisors was in conference two days ago with members of the state highway department and the Metropolitan advisory committee at which plans for 1931 were outlined.

Route 60 Has Priority

The state is interested in completing Route 60, the road that amounts to an extension of Rand road through the lake regions and into McHenry county, and Route 53 that runs through the Half Day district into Palatine and then circles around Chicago and into the Indiana district.

In addition it is hoped to complete Route 57, the new Skokie road that runs into Highland Park, and Route 68, the extension of Telegraph road, and No. 173 from Zion to Rockford, if possible.

May Be Delayed

Some of these highways, Mr. Lobdell explained, are in a point of controversy largely over location. Surveys will be completed as soon as physically possible and the necessary papers sent so that the rights-of-way can be obtained.

On No. 68 there has been considerable protest in behalf of the City of Waukegan, the Swedish-American club and the Vikings. As planned this road would be continued from the end of Washington street across the Des Plaines river, and across Milwaukee avenue, at a point near Grange Hall road. From there it would run north through Wadsworth and into Wisconsin.

County Work

The county, if possible, will build 15 miles of road which would include the completion of the Millburn road, now built from Pikeville to Wedges Corners, on the Cook county line. This would run past Druce lake, Gages lake, Mundelein, and Half Day to the boundary.
