Leadership Training School Is Planned By Churches, Feb. 9-Mar. 16

The superintendents and representatives from nearly all of the Sunday schools of Deerfield and Shields townships met at the Bethany Evangelical church Tuesday evening. The meeting was very encouraging and enthusiastic. Nearly every one present expressed words of praise concerning the school that was held last year. The group was unanimous in their opinion that another similar school should be conducted this year. The time set for this school is February 9 to March 16. The classes will meet each Monday evening during this period from 7:30 to 9:30, all classes will be conducted in the parish house of the Presbyterian church in Highland Park. The following courses will be offered: "A Study of Middle Childhood," which will be for beginners and primary teachers; "A Study of Later Childhood," for junior teachers; "A Study of Adolescence," for intermediate and senior teachers; "Training for Worship and Devotional Life," this course will appeal to all other teachers in Sunday school work and especially to superintendents and officers.

The school last year had an enrollment that exceeded 100 scholars, with an average attendance of over 80. It is the hope of those who are fostering the school of this year, that many more will avail themselves of this splendid opportunity of additional training. The faculty members for this school have not as yet been selected. A committee was appointed to confer with those who are available and secure the services of those best fitted for the work. Tuition for the course will be \$2.00 per scholar. Anyone in the community interested in Sunday school work is invited to enroll. Many parents also will want to take some of these courses, it will help them to better understand their children.
