

Man Found Sleeping by Highwood Police Badly Frozen, May Lose Feet

Caught in the bitter cold of New Year's eve John Buckley, 43 years old, of 1109 Adams street, North Chicago, probably will lose both feet and may have to have his legs amputated near both knees it was learned at the county hospital.

If an amputation is necessary the legs probably will be taken off midway between the ankles and the knees.

Adams explained to nurses at the hospital that he had gone out on a party New Year's eve. He admitted that he drank to excess and as a result he fell asleep alongside the road.

The man, still sleeping and in a comatose condition, was found by Highwood police and rushed to the county hospital.

Buckley had no recollection of where he had been or where he had been found by the police.

Port Clinton Park

This park is a recent addition and is situated in the north section of Highland Park, facing on Bloom street and St. Johns avenue. 
