Lake Zurich flashed plenty of form in taking Deerfield, 30 to 22. L. Frank was high scorer for the winners while Siegert and Bleimehl were high for Deerfield.

Northbrook set the season's scoring record by blasting Arlington Heights into their fifth straight loss 52 to 30, at Northbrook Friday. Besides setting the season's high scoring game total, Northbrook's leading scorer Erickson tied the season's individual game total with 20 points, counting eight field goals and four free throws. The 20 point mark was first set by Siegert, Deerfield, who accumulated his joint possession of the record against Glenview Dec. 23. Erickson established himself as one of the greatest hoopsters in the circuit in his performance and incidentally ran his season's total scoring mark to 69. He has averaged better than 12 points per game for the five contests in which he has appeared.

Diederich, Arlington's leading scorer, and H. Prosser, starred for the losers.

Lake Zurich was at Des Plaines Tuesday, expecting plenty of opposition; Morton had no easy set-up at Deerfield on the same date. Arlington appeared scheduled to come through for their first win, Wednesday, at Niles Center. Northbrook looked for little more than a work-out and a chance for Erickson to pile up his season's total against Glenview Thursday.

## "Silent Enemy" and "The Cat Creeps" Head Fine Alcyon Program

More than 100 real Indians participated in the making of "The Silent Enemy." No white man appears in the picture, according to William D. Burden, producer of this epic of the American red-man.

"The Silent Enemy," which will show at the Alcyon theatre, Saturday, is the drama of the Red Man's fight against hunger in the trackless wilds of the north.

### Remote Control

A portable broadcasting radio station was erected on the Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer set when William Haines made the radio scenes for "Remote Control," which will come Sunday to the Alcyon theatre. Haines' voice was transmitted from the portable station to the set where the actual scenes were filmed, his voice recording through a regular receiving set. Edward Sedgwick directed the picturization of the stage play with Mary Doran in the leading feminine role. Included in the cast are Charles King, Polly Moran, John Milian and J. C. Nurent.

### "The Cat Creeps"

A breathless quality of suspense pervades "The Cat Creeps," the Universal mystery drama which will be shown at the Alcyon theatre Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday. The very atmosphere is heavy with dread, and there are many hair-raising moments when the auditor feels impelled to relieve pent-up emotions with a lusty shriek. This story was adapted from

the famous stage "thriller," "The Cat and the Canary," and on the screen it is even more effective than it was on the stage, where it has long been recognized as one of the most spine-tingling plays ever written.

A great cast interprets the screen production, with Helen Twelvetrees bringing her blonde beauty and her undoubtedly powerful histrionic talent to the principal feminine role. Appearing opposite her is Raymond Hackett, who contributes an altogether pleasing performance as Paul a young man who is just a little bit afraid of ghosts, in spite of himself. Jean Hersholt and Montagu Love enact their roles with the forceful artistry for which they are well known, and a bright spot is added to the picture by the blase wisecracking of the irresponsible Lilyan Tashman. Other members of the cast are similarly excellent in their roles.
