EMPLOYMENT STILL GREAT NEED HERE

Social Service Group Reports Work Biggest Factor to Be Provided For

The great need of the Highland Park Social Service still is work! There are over two hundred registered without employment and only from thirty to thirty-five given the opportunity for even a few hours work each week. The Social Service office can fill every call promptly but has only about one sixth enough calls a day to care for those registered.

Appreciation Is Shown

One of the most satisfactory experiences in the Social Service office is finding how appreciative people are for work given them. In fully three-fourths of the cases, those getting work return to report earnings. In many cases phone calls come from employes expressing satisfaction for work of man or woman sent to them. Many people call to have the same workers sent to them for further work as they have proven their ability and willingness.

Articles Badly Needed

A cot and mattress, a high chair, and a twin baby carriage are needed by the Social Service committee. If you can furnish any one of these, call H. P. 4000.

If some one registered in the office needs a dining table there is one available for someone who needs it and can call for it.

The North Shore Art league is having an exhibit at the Chicago Women's club E. 11th street Chicago. Many of the north shore's representative painters are showing their work.

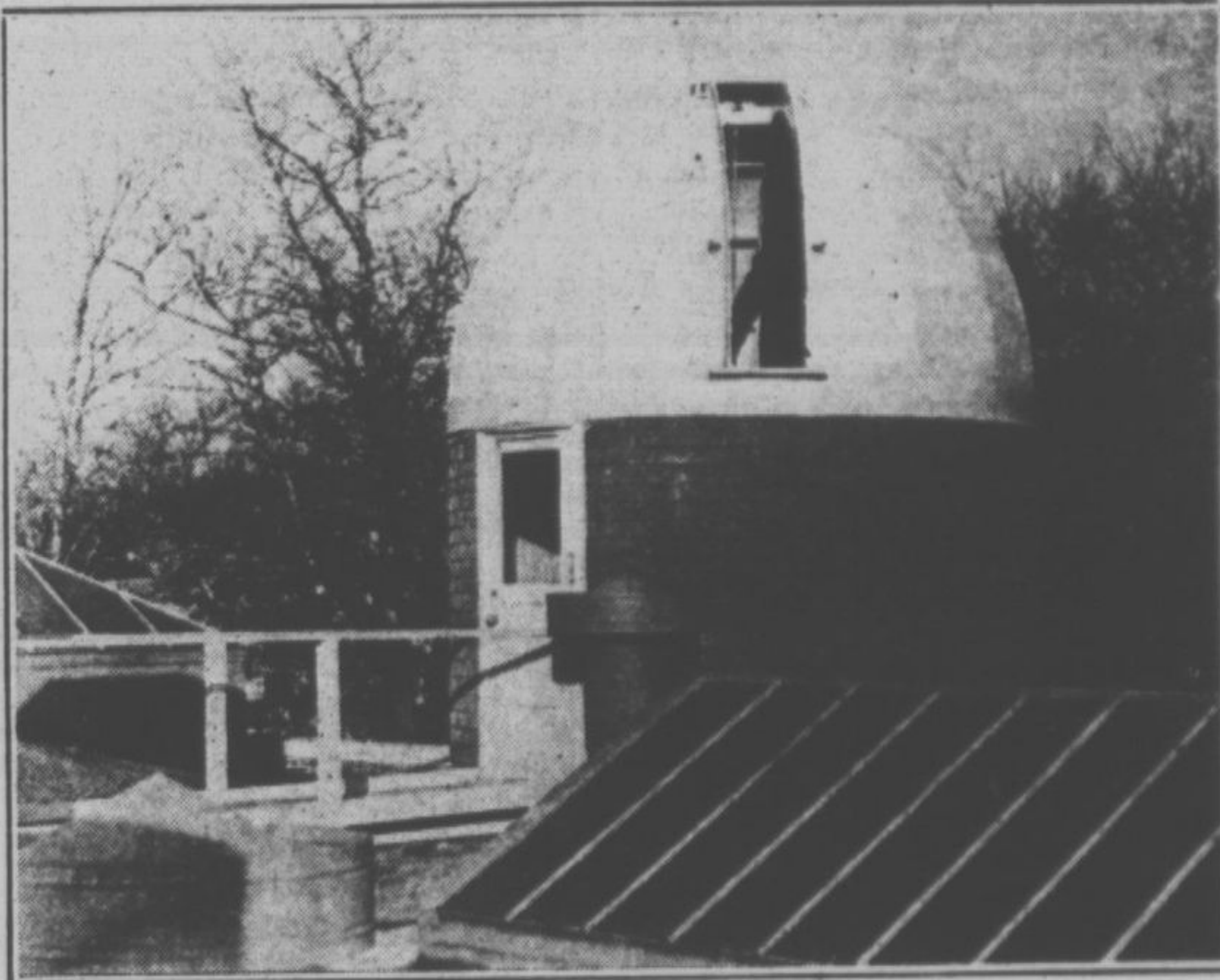

British Philosopher To Speak at Woman's Club Tuesday, Jan. 20

Since the dawn of civilization, men have been seeking feverishly for happiness in a world of physical, moral and mental struggle against obstacles. Most of the great religions, and all of the philosophies have included the promise of happiness, either in this world or in the world to come.

And yet, complete happiness, like the fountain of eternal youth, remains an elusive mystery, which few mortals attain.

Boldly facing the facts, Dr. Charles Obermeyer, an eminent British philosopher and psychologist, whose background of study in England's greatest halls of learning, and of travel in all parts of the world, has developed a philosophy which proves
