R. Arthur Wood Heads Central Committee of Boy Scout Campaign

R. Arthur Wood, of Highland Park, president of the Chicago Stock Exchange, has accepted an invitation from Gen. Robert E. Wood, general chairman of the campaign for \$50,000 now getting under way on behalf of the North Shore Area Council, Boy Scouts of America, to identify himself with the movement as chairman of the central committee in charge of advance subscriptions. It was announced yesterday by General Wood's secretary.

Other North Shore residents who have accepted appointments on the temporary campaign organization are Louis B. Kuppenheimer, Winnetka, who will serve as vice chairman; Dr. Samuel Harkness, pastor of the First Congregational church of Winnetka, who will head the Speakers Bureau; Samuel Insull, Jr. of Libertyville, campaign treasurer; and Dan G. Stiles, Wilmette, chairman of the lists committee.

Gilbert E. Porter III, of Lake Forest, will serve as vice chairman of the central committee, while Robert Doepel of Winnetka will head the Service club committee. Active supervision of the campaign is being maintained by Albert P. Snite, Highland Park, assisting General Wood as executive vice chairman, and also by the steering committee, composed of Henry Fowler, Wilmette, chairman, Henry K. Urion, Winnetka, and Karl D. King, Wilmette, according to campaign headquarters at Highland Park.

The amount of \$50,000 which is being sought is to be used to purchase increased facilities at the council's summer camp, Camp Ma-Ka-Ja-Wan, as well as to sustain scouting activities in the North Shore Area until 1932. Towns included in the North Shore Area Council's supervision are: Lake Forest, Highland Park, Libertyville, Glenview, Deerfield, Northbrook, Wilmette, Glencoe, Kenilworth, Winnetka and neighboring communities. The intensive solicitation of contributions will take place during National Scout Anniversary week, February 8 to 15.

Meet in Highland Park Friday Night to Take Up Gas Rate Matters

Representatives from 14 towns and villages on the north shore will gather in the city hall in Highland Park Friday evening to draft plans for the fight on rates of the North Shore Gas company which they will carry to the Illinois Commerce commission, according to the Waukegan Times, which says:

The cities and villages which are expected to enter the fight includes: Winthrop Harbor, Zion, Waukegan, North Chicago, Lake Bluff, Lake Forest, Highwood, Highland Park, Glencoe and Winnetka on the shore and the village of Gurnee, Deerfield, Libertyville and Mundelein in the inner county.

The proposals of three engineering firms for the task of checking on the valuation, income and earnings of the North Shore Gas company, on which the appeal for lower rates will be based are to be considered at the meeting. Indications are that the bids of one firm will be approved.

The 14 cities and villages are asking for a 10 per cent cut in rates and a revision in the sliding scale basis.

Report of Fire Chief for Year Is Submitted

During 1930, 268 fires were extinguished by members of the Highland Park fire department the total fire loss being estimated at \$28,300, according to the annual report of Fire Chief Edward C. Hoskin made to the city council.

Property valued at \$1,257,200 was involved in the fires according to the report.

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
