**Mrs. Emily C. Dow
Passes Away Jan. 13**

Funeral services for Mrs. Emily Cochrane Dow, of Ravinia, were held at Grace and cemetery chapel on Tuesday, Jan. 13.

Born in Windham, New Hampshire of old Colonial stock, Mrs. Dow came west on a visit to Chicago shortly after the Civil war. Married Asa Dow, a distant relative, and settled on West Adams street, where she was an eye-witness of the great Chicago fire. For several years, Mr. Dow was president of the Chicago board of trade. Since 1918, Mrs. Dow made her home in Ravinia with her daughter, Mrs. Thomas W. Allinson on Wade street, where she died early Sunday morning. She was the mother of Mrs. Harold C. Dow, of Detroit, and grandmother of Brent Dow Allison.

**City Council Moves to
Issue Tax Warrants for
Library Building Fund**

At the regular meeting of the city council Monday evening a resolution was filed providing for the issue of tax anticipation warrants sufficient to raise \$26,000 for the public library building fund, in compliance with a request from the library board for 75 per cent of its appropriation for this purpose. The resolution will be acted upon later.

Commissioner Gourley was, on motion, authorized to act as mayor pro tem, in the absence of Mayor Lewis. Commissioner Reay also was absent.

Commissioner Zimmer moved that an ordinance establishing and fixing election precincts in the City of Highland Park, be passed, as read. The motion prevailed.

Commissioner Brown moved that an ordinance amending Section 1 and 2 of chapter XV of the Highland Park code of 1919 be placed on file for public inspection complete in form for one week before its final passage. The motion prevailed.

Commissioner Zimmer moved that Frederick Hodgdon be allowed a final payment of \$645.93, being full compensation for architectural fees in connection with the City hall building in accordance with his contract therefor.
