Figures for Year Show Decrease From 1929; H. P. Third in Lake County

Building construction in the metropolitan area of Chicago for the year 1930 totals \$111,695,974, according to the building survey department of S. W. Straus & Co. This volume is contrasted to the 1929 total of \$274,875,-747, or more than twice that of 1930.

Forty-five suburbs within a fortymile radius of the city plus Chicago itself are included in the survey. The total for the suburbs alone is \$32,-082,514, for Chicago \$79,613,400. In 1929 the total for the same suburbs "The Highway," the bi-monthly was \$72,588,947, for Chicago \$202,for the year in Lake county, with Lake Forest first and Waukegan sec-
