Praise for Secretary

The board of directors of 24 mem-
 bers have set in motion all the many
 plans for the progress of this asso-
 ciation. There must be a head to
 all organizations and as is the way
 of Y. W. C. A.'s; a general secretary
 is chosen. Highland Park is most
 fortunate in that choice. Mrs. Lydia
 Hutton can put more ideas into the
 heads of her board than anyone ever
 dreamed of. She is an untiring
 worker, an organizer, has a vision
 for new needs and opportunities. She
 has opened the way for girls and
 women to be a part of the Young
 Women's Christian association, and
 has helped them to know the real
 meaning of the Blue Triangle.

We have mentioned that Y. W. is
 a home for girls. There must be a
 home maker and that is Miss Ames.
 I think if we wanted to give Miss
 Ames an epithet, we could say, "Miss
 Ames the Faithful." One of the girls
 said to me, "We just love Miss Ames,
 she is so good to us."

Because of the growth of Girl Re-

spirations and the need of new organiza-
 tions, it was necessary to employ an
 assistant to the general secretary.
 Mrs. Carl McManus was chosen. She
 has applied herself most diligently
 and has contributed with original
 ideas and plans to the Girl Reserve
 work.

Board a Factor

But no matter how efficient these
 secretaries may be, they would be
 very limited in their plans if it were
 not for the board of directors. Each
 member of this board has played her
 part in making this the year it has
 been in Highland Park Y. W. C. A.

Two secretaries from the National
 board have met with the Highland
 Park board at different times to ad-
 vise and help. Besides the helpful
 literature that comes to us contin-
 ually. Three members of the board
 and the general secretary attended
 the National Convention in Detroit
 in April. It was an inspiration to all
 of them to meet women from all over
 our land giving their time, service,
 and thought to this problem of help-
 ing girls and women to find the true
 way and better their conditions. The
 field of thought was broadened and
 new aspects of this great National
 and Inter-National Y. W. C. A. were
 unfolded in this great gathering of
 forward thinking women. 22 girls
 from this Y. W. C. A. have attended
 conferences and conventions during
 the year. Contacts that bring in-

spirations and broadening ideas to all
 of us.

Field Enlarged

The field of service has been en-
 larged greatly during the past year.
 Girl Reserves clubs have been organ-
 ized in Deerfield, Wilmot, Highwood,
 Ravinia and Green Bay schools. Now
 there are Girl Reserves clubs in all
 of the schools of Highland Park, Ra-
 vinia, Deerfield and Highwood. A
 splendid new business girls club was
 organized and the industrial girls
 club have been enlarged. The Mothers
 club has kept their good record
 and broadened their activities. With
 these new clubs and many more com-
 ing to our Y. W. C. A. new needs
 were felt and the education commit-
 tee headed by a most efficient chair-
 man, Mrs. Jared Johnson, offered a
 splendid program that was eagerly
 accepted. 317 enrolled in the pro-
 gram.

During the summer a splendid camp
 was conducted by the general secre-
 tary and six advisers at Druce lake,
 Illinois. 56 girls a week living, think-
 ing and training together for two
 weeks is a real test and character de-
 ve'oper.

Annual Campaign

The annual campaign for mainten-
 ance funds was held in October. It
 was organized and carried through by
 our own board with the help of our
 good friends that volunteered their
 service. Mrs. W. A. Alexander was
 chairman and with her efficient com-
 mittees worked hard for several
 weeks. 861 subscribed to the budget.
 We are grateful to the public for the
 extent of their support, although it
 did not cover our budget. It will
 take planning and cutting to adjust
 our financial needs of the next year.
 But we feel sure after the present
 depression, the people of Highland
 Park will rally to our full need. The
 House committee under the chair-
 manship of Mrs. Alfred Burdick has
 done such efficient work that our Y.
 W. home has become very attractive.
 The house has been painted inside
 and out, some new furnishings and
 several gifts in the way of furniture,
 pictures etc., have been received. The
 rooming capacity has been filled con-
 tinually. We have housed 429 girls
 for one or more nights. Our audi-
 torium has been in demand. It has
 been used for recreational groups,
 lodges, clubs, the League of Women
 Voters, Girl Scouts and church soci-
 eties, besides our own club groups.

Two Style Shows

Two style shows, in the spring and
 fall have been held here. Put on by
 the merchants. We are pleased to
 have these contacts with our busi-
 ness men and women. We are grate-
 ful to them for their co-operation and
 we wish to especially thank the High-
 land Park Press and Highland Park
 News for their many favors they
 have shown us.

We have co-operated with the
 Highland Park hospital and the re-
 cently organized Social Service com-
 mittee. We were organized to serve.
 We have done so. We are a com-
 munity center and the door is open
 to all the citizens of Highland Park
 and vicinity.
