AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE AMENDMENT TO THE ZONING ORDINANCE OF FEBRUARY 17, 1930

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF the City of Highland Park:

SECTION 1. That an ordinance entitled "An Ordinance amending an ordinance entitled 'An Ordinance to regulate and limit the height and bulk of buildings; to regulate and limit the intensity of the use of lot areas, and to regulate and determine the areas of open spaces within and surrounding such buildings; to classify, regulate, and restrict the location of trades and industries and the location of buildings designed for specified industrial, business, residential, and other uses; to divide the entire City of Highland Park into districts for the purpose of this ordinance; to fix standards to which buildings or structures shall conform; to prohibit uses, buildings, or structures incompatible with the character of such districts respectively; and to prevent additions to and alterations or remodeling of existing buildings or structures in such a way as to avoid the restrictions and limitations lawfully imposed hereunder, and to provide penalties for violation hereof,'" as amended, be and the same is hereby amended by adding Paragraph g to Section 2, Article IX, as follows:

g. The exercise of the right of eminent domain or of condemnation in connection with widening of roads, or the construction of new roads, shall not render non-conforming as to minimum lot area, any premises, which, prior to the exercise of such right of eminent domain or of condemnation, conformed to the minimum lot area requirements of this ordinance.

SECTION 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with or inconsistent with the provisions of this Ordinance are hereby repealed.

SECTION 3. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval and due publication.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING ARTICLE IV, SECTION 1 OF THE AMENDMENT TO THE ZONING ORDINANCE PASSED JANUARY 27, 1930.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HIGHLAND PARK:

SECTION 1. That an ordinance entitled "An Ordinance amending an ordinance entitled 'An Ordinance to regulate and limit the height and bulk of buildings; to regulate and limit the intensity of the use of lot areas, and to regulate and determine the areas of open spaces within and surrounding such buildings; to classify, regulate, and restrict the location of trades and industries

and the location of buildings designed for specified industrial, business, residential, and other uses; to divide the entire City of Highland Park into districts for the purpose of this ordinance; to fix standards to which buildings or structures shall conform; to prohibit uses, buildings, or structures incompatible with the character of such districts respectively; and to prevent additions to and alterations or remodeling of existing buildings or structures in such a way as to avoid the restrictions and limitations lawfully imposed hereunder, and to provide penalties for violation hereof,'" as amended, be and the same is hereby amended and altered by changing the present paragraph 8 of Section 1, Article IV to paragraph 9 and by adding the following as paragraph 8 of Section 1, Article IV:

"8. Clubs not conducted as a business or for profit, and situated on premises not less than twenty (20) acres in area."

SECTION 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with or inconsistent with the provisions of this Ordinance are hereby repealed.

SECTION 3. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval and due publication.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING PARAGRAH 47 OF SECTION 1, ARTICLE VI OF THE AMENDMENT TO THE ZONING ORDINANCE PASSED JANUARY 27, 1930.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HIGHLAND PARK:

SECTION 1. That an ordinance entitled "An Ordinance amending an ordinance entitled 'An Ordinance to regulate and limit the height and bulk of buildings; to regulate and limit the intensity of the use of lot areas, and to regulate and determine the areas of open spaces within and surrounding such buildings; to classify, regulate, and restrict the location of trades and industries and the location of buildings designed for specified industrial, business, residential, and other uses; to divide the entire City of Highland Park into districts for the purpose of this ordinance; to fix standards to which buildings or structures shall conform; to prohibit uses, buildings, or structures incompatible with the character of such districts respectively; and to prevent additions to and alterations or remodeling of existing buildings or structures in such a way as to avoid the restrictions and limitations lawfully imposed hereunder, and to provide penalties for violation hereof,'" as amended, be and the same is hereby amended, by altering Paragraph 47 of Section 1, Article VI to read as follows:

"47. The use of premises or buildings as Dancing Academies, Filling Stations, Lodge Halls, Public Garages and theatres, shall be subject to the regulations of the present or hereafter adopted laws and ordinances of the City of Highland Park; provided that no person, firm or corporation shall locate, build, construct or maintain premises or buildings for the purposes of Dancing Academies, Lodge Halls, Public Garages or Theatres within two hundred (200) feet of any building used as and for a Hospital, Church, Library, Public or Private School, or within two hundred (200) feet of the district boundary line of an "A" or "B" district. The two hundred (200) feet mentioned shall in both cases be measured along the street line of the street or streets on which the premises abut."

SECTION 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with or inconsistent with the provisions of this Ordinance are hereby repealed.

SECTION 3. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, and approval and due publication.
