## REPORT ON INCOME NORTHWESTERN ROAD

### Statistics for 1930 Given Out by President; Revenues and Expenditure

According to a statement made yesterday by Fred W. Sargent, president of the North Western lines, net income of the system for 1930, after taxes and charges, will be approximately \$8,400,000. This more than covers the dividend of \$4 a year on the common stock, which was reduced in November last from \$5 a year, after three quarterly dividends of \$1.25 each had been paid. The fourth quarter payment was 25 cents.

#### December Reduction

Gross revenues of the North Western in December, 1930, were practically \$2,300,000 less than the \$10,905,620 reported for the like month in 1929. Net operating income for the recent month was approximately \$1,000,000 greater than the \$66,333 reported for December, 1929, when severe weather cut heavily into the earnings of the system. These conditions were not experienced in the recent month. Transportation expenses for December, 1930, were \$1,000,000 less and maintenance of way expenditures were also \$1,000,000 under the figures in the previous December.

#### Outside Income Higher

Mr. Sargent stated that income from outside sources in 1930 increased approximately \$650,000 as compared with 1929. In addition, there was an increase of \$160,000 realized on funded securities.

Although the road's earnings have not been at as favorable a level in the last year as in previous years, the lines are in sound financial position and by the employment of further methods of operating efficiency will be in a condition to take advantage of an upturn in the business situation when that turn arrives, it is asserted.

## Two Youths Convicted of Larceny in Circuit Court; One Is Acquitted

Donovan Waugh, of Highwood, was found guilty of robbery, and Folke Linderholm of Lake Forest, was convicted of larceny while Ralph Linderholm, brother of Folke, was acquitted by a jury that returned a sealed verdict last week in circuit court. The jurors debated the case 14 hours.

The three were charged with the robbery of the Lester Denman store on Belvidere street, Waukegan, Nov. 12, 1930. Detective Sergeant Thomas McMahon produced the convicting evidence.

Motions for new trials were made by Attorney Charles E. Mason and Mortimer Singer, the defense counsel. These will be opposed by Attorney Wilfred E. Hall, who prosecuted for the states attorney.

## File Petition for Civil Service in This City

A petition signed by 1,200 residents, headed by Thomas S. Duffy, was filed in the county court this week asking that the question of civil service for Highland Park be submitted to the voters at the next election.

Some petitioners stated that they want civil service for the city employes in Highland Park similar to that now in operation in Waukegan. The 24 separate petitions, each bearing 50 signatures, ask that Highland Park "adopt and become entitled to the benefits of an act to regulate the civil service of cities" based on the legislation of 1885.

## Lake Zurich Case Is Taken Under Advisement

Judge Edward D. Shurtleff is considering whether Lake Zurich is owned by Mayor August Froelich of Lake Zurich and several other property holders or whether it is a navigable body of water open to the use of hundreds of cottagers who live near the lake in the summer time.

After arguments for and against the master-in-chancery findings, returned by Judge Ralph J. Dady while he was master, by opposing counsel, Judge Shurtleff last week at Woodstock took the case under advisement. He will render a decision within two weeks.
