Dismiss Last Charge Against Moran in Lake County: Is at Liberty

George "Bugs" Moran, who was recently discharged in Waukegan by a jury on a charge of being a public vagrant, last week resumed the role of an ordinary citizen in Lake county when State's Attorney A. V. Smith dropped his last charges against him in county court.

The final charge was that of carrying concealed weapons which was brought after his arrest at the Elizabeth Cassidy place at Bluff lake. A small revolver, which Moran said he used to kill game fish when on trips, was picked up in his bedroom.

The gun was not in his possession when he was arrested and the prosecutor never held hopes of a conviction on this charge. He kept it at the time so that the bond would be sufficiently high.

At the same time the padlock proceedings against Mrs. Cassidy were dropped as was the information against Leo Mongoven, said to be the right hand lieutenant of Moran.

Mongoven has been reported dead and then alive at various times during the last few months. The last definite word on him was received four weeks ago when Constable George Stried of the sponge squad saw him in Kenosha.

Police Radio Plan Is Gaining on North Shore; Evanston Trying It Out

As a result of successful use by Chicago and Oak Park police, the north shore and Evanston are taking immediate steps to install radio equipped squad cars. It is expected that this will result in the most complete police radio hook-up in existence by early spring.

Complete installation of a shore wide hook-up, reaching from Chicago to the Wisconsin state line will result in a tremendous speeding up of police methods, according to Chief William O. Freeman of Evanston. Chief Freeman's observations are based on the first month's operation of the first set installed in Evanston in connection with the Chicago broadcasting station.

So far, two Evanston squad cars have been equipped with radio. These are a detective bureau squad car and a safety bureau car. Records for the latter, maintained by Chief Clerk Roland F. Moore of the record division, show that there has been a decrease of 75 per cent on the time elapsing between the receiving of a call and the arrival of the police on the scene of action.

ASSESSED VALUE OF RAILWAYS IN COUNTY

Total for Seven Is Placed at \$10,953,395; Other Corporations Listed

Assessed valuation of the seven railroads in Lake county for 1930 is \$10,953,395, according to the estimates of Chester Huston in the county clerk's office. Capital stock of corporations assessed in Lake county is \$453,100.

The assessment is \$7,198 more than in 1929 despite the non-existence of the Palatine, Lake Zurich and Wauconda railroad this year. The assessed valuation for 1929 was \$10,946,197.

The Chicago, Milwaukee and North Shore railroad, the only electric road operating in the county, heads the list of companies for 1930 with an assessed valuation of \$2,282,762. The Chicago, Milwaukee, St. Paul and Pacific company is second with \$2,098,434.

Valuation of the other roads are the E. J. and E., \$2,091,411; the Chicago and North Western, \$2,059,897; the Wisconsin Central, \$1,081,245; Milwaukee State Line, \$868,650, and the Chicago and Northern, \$470,996.

Other Corporations

The North Shore Gas company of Waukegan heads the corporations in Lake county in the capital stock assessments with \$225,000. The taxes on capital stock is paid in addition to the tangible property assessments.

Other corporations whose capital stock assessed valuation is reported by the tax commission are the Karcher hotel, \$85,000; Miller Investment company of Libertyville, \$26,000; Brae Lock Golf Sports club of Grays lake, \$25,000; Bella Casa Building Corporation, of Waukegan, \$16,000; Highways Construction company of Highland Park, \$15,000; Hotel Waukegan corporation, \$10,000, and 23 other corporations from \$8,300 to \$300. Two of the corporations listed by the tax commission, both of Waukegan, are now out of business.

Capital stock valuations as reported by the tax commission for the various corporations show Waukegan leading with \$362,700; Libertyville, \$28,000; Grays lake, \$25,800; Highland Park, \$19,800; Prairie View, \$1,700; North Chicago, \$1,000, and Antioch, \$400.
