

JUDGE BARNES RITES HELD HERE SUNDAY

Service at Presbyterian Church for Able Jurist Whose Death Occurred Jan. 22

Judge Albert Crane Barnes, a member of the Appellate court since 1912, died Thursday night of last week, in his home at 437 Egandale road, Highland Park, following a heart attack. He was considered by his associates as one of the ablest judges of the Superior court, to which he was first elected in 1904. He was 77 years old.

The judge first became ill during a session of court on Dec. 16. He was assisted to his home and had been confined there since that time. A substitute was assigned to temporarily take his place in the reviewing court.

Served Under Deneen

Judge Barnes started his political career when he was appointed as one of the assistants to Charles S. Deneen (Continued on page 30)

In Role of "Four Minute Men" They Will Speak to Various Groups

Uniformed Boy Scouts in the role of the four "minute men," extolling the virtues and benefits of the scout movement before more than a 100 audiences in north shore churches, service clubs and theaters, will be a feature of the campaign for \$50,000 for camp improvement and maintenance now being inaugurated by the scout council of the north shore area, of which Gen. Robert E. Wood is general chairman, with Albert D. Lasker of Lake Forest and Thomas J. Condon of Winnetka, recent appointees as vice-chairmen.

This unique plan is being perfected by the campaign speakers' bureau, of which Dr. Samuel Harkness, pastor of the First Congregational church of Winnetka, is chairman.

The campaign is scheduled to close with a victory dinner of Tuesday, Feb. 17.

Leaders Training Course
The fourth session of the scout leaders training courses will be held at the Deerfield-Shields high school at 7:30 on Monday and Wednesday, Feb. 2, and 4. The Monday night session is in the elementary training while the Wednesday night session is in advanced work for those men who have graduated from the elementary course. Mr. H. P. Clarke of the Winnetka schools, a veteran scout leader is to speak and lead discussion at the Wednesday night course. These courses are open to any adult men who wish to enroll, whether scoutmaster, committeeman "Dad" or interested citizens.
