Deerfield-Shields high school basketball teams took a pair of games from the Maine Township high school at the latter school Tuesday. The heavyweights won 18-10, and the lights 33-12.

when the latter was state's attorney from 1896 to 1904. Before that time he practiced law in North Dakota, although he was admitted to the bar in New York in 1877.

He was elevated to the bench in 1904 and has been successively re-elected in 1911, 1917 and 1923. Because of his experience and ability he was designated by the Supreme court in 1912 to be one of the Appellate judges.

Judge Barnes was educated at the University of Vermont and graduated in the class of 1876. He was a former president of the Criminal Law and Criminology society, Sons of the Revolution and New England society. He was also a Mason and an Odd Fellow and a member of the Sigma Phi fraternity.

Judge Barnes is survived by his widow, the former Jessie Griswold, daughter of a prominent manufacturer, whom he married in 1898.

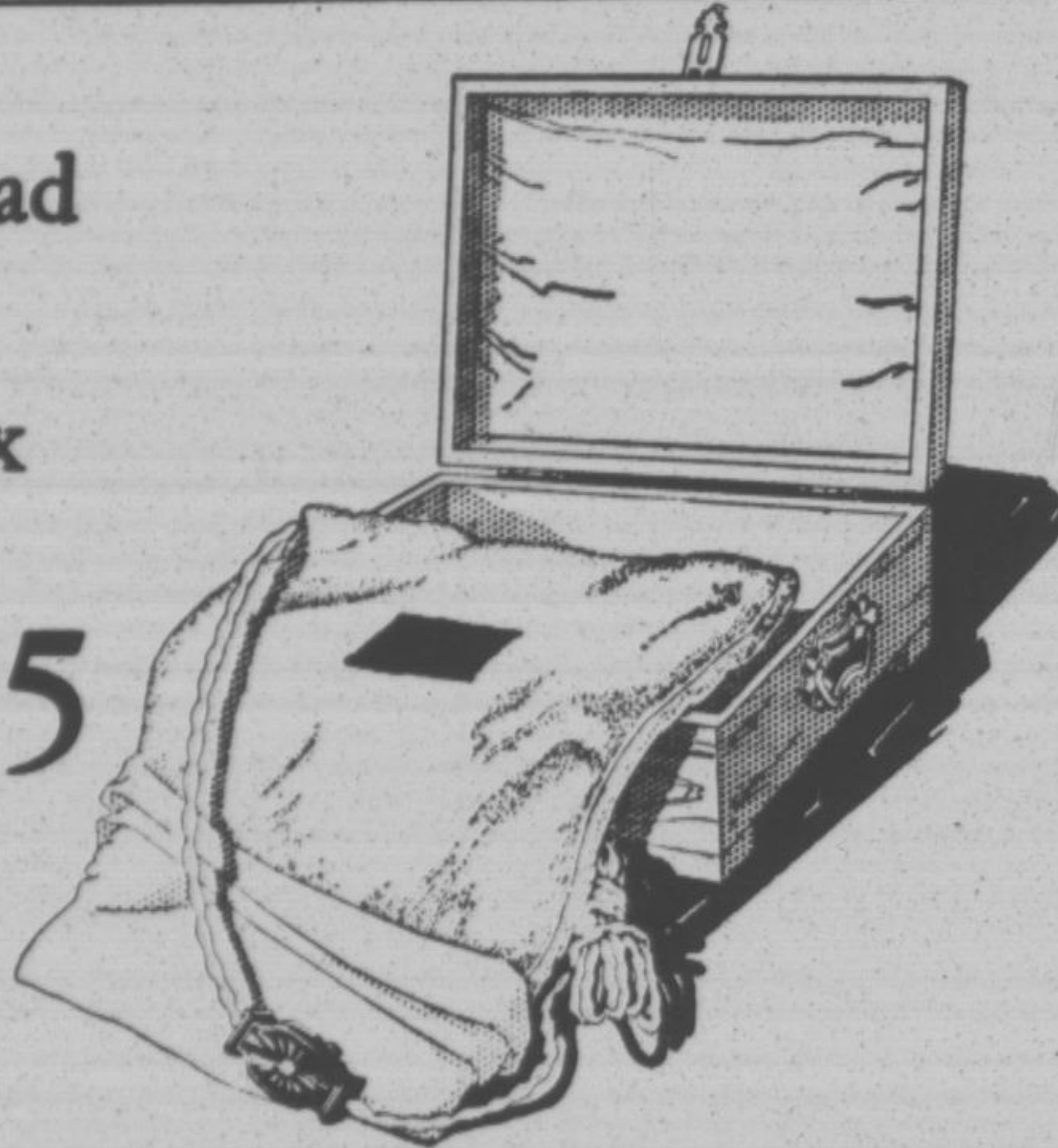
Funeral services were held Sunday afternoon at the Presbyterian church of Highland Park. Relatives and judiciary associates attended. The Rev. David Hugh Jones of the First Presbyterian church of Evanston, a close friend of Judge Barnes, officiated. Judge Barnes' body was taken to Graceland cemetery Monday for cremation, and the ashes were to be sent to his birthplace, Chimney Point, Addison county, Vt.
