

## PARK BOARD BUYS TENNIS CLUB TRACT

### Adds Property of Ravinia Group to Its Holdings and Will Operate Courts

The Park Board recently purchased the property belonging to the Ravinia Tennis club and will operate it for the benefit of the residents of the district in a similar manner to the Sunset Valley Golf course.

Any resident of the Park District may use these courts upon paying the required fee and complying with the rules prescribed by the Park Board.

This will be a worthy addition to the Park Boards recreational activities next summer and provide an opportunity for many to play tennis who would otherwise be deprived of this recreation. In addition to the property of the club the easterly portion of lot 43 was also secured. This provides a connecting link between the tennis property and the park recently acquired by the Board through special assessment proceedings west of the C. & N. W. R.R. right-of-way, and adds materially to its value and adaptability for park purposes.

The incomplete shelter house on the property will be conditioned and conveniences added for the comfort of the public.

Mr. Milton Hardacre, who was active in securing this property for the Park district, has been a member of the Board for more than six years.

By this purchase of an established activity the Park Board has again shown its constant interest in providing recreational facilities for the people of the district.

A number of years ago when the golf course was in progress of development the patrons of the course felt the need of a so-called clubhouse. The matter was discussed at length by the Golf club and Park Board. Some objection was raised to the matter offering as a reason that the public would not conduct itself properly in a place of this character.

It is hard to understand how this false impression came about unless it was through some regrettable incident that occurred at a semi-public building operated by a local organization and likewise at public dances.

The conduct of the public at the Sunset Valley clubhouse has always been above reproach and is an example of what to expect of the public at any building operated by a governmental organization such as the Park Board which is vested with municipal authority and police power not possible in any private organization regardless of how good the intention may be.

A municipal body carries with it the power to provide funds by taxation for the successful operation of public recreational activities and thereby perpetuate them.

Wherever he went he was known as a remarkable man of unusual cheerfulness and appreciation. Always happy and smiling he often said, "I want to live as long as I can, do all the good I can, and be happy along the way."

He served three years in the Civil war, then entered the grain business. He married Sarah Martin of Lafayette, Indiana, with whom he lived happily to celebrate his fiftieth anniversary. After retiring from business the need of some activity led him to solicit for the Oak Leaves, Highland Park Press, and other papers along the North Shore.

He was a member of the Winnetka Congregational church, the Gideons, the I. O. O. F., and the Phil Sheridan Post.

He is survived by a daughter, Mrs. Arthur B. Haven, Highland Park, and a son Mr. George Timberlake of Centralia, Ill.; three grand children and a great grandchild.
