The state tax commission met last week in Springfield, head the petition of a Illinois agricultural association for equalization of land tax assessments throughout the state.

Such action probably would increase taxes in the northern third of the state, decrease them in the southern third and effect varying adjustments in the central counties.

"The relation between the sale price and the tax assessment shows a wide variance in different parts of the state," said John C. Watson, tax expert of the Illinois Agricultural association.

"Roughly speaking, the assessments in the northern two thirds of the state are 30 to 40 per cent of the sale price. In the southern third, south of a line stretching from Paris to East St. Louis, the assessments are 40 to 45 per cent of the sales value. In the central section the percentage runs up to 60 per cent and in one instance to 70 per cent."
