### See Increase in Taxes in Four Towns If L. F. High School Gets O.K.

If the pending supreme court action favors the Lake Forest high school board there will be increases of 16 cents in Lake Forest and 30 cents in Highland Park, Highwood and Deerfield to the tax rates computed for these municipalities under the Deerfield-Shields high school, it was revealed Tuesday by Deputy County Clerks Robert Pearsall and Chester Huston, according to the Waukegan News-Sun.

Under the present assessment, based on the one high school, Lake Forest, Highland Park and Highwood each showed a marked increase in the tax rates on the 1930 valuation, as compared to the tax rates for 1929. The village of Deerfield shows a decrease of 6 cents.

The Lake Forest high school board was dissolved by a ruling by Judge Edward D. Shurtleff in circuit court in Waukegan. The high school board appealed to the supreme court which is expected to hand down a ruling on the circuit court decision some time this month.

The tax rates which include \$1.08 for the Deerfield-Shields high school, will be increased to \$1.24 for Lake Forest and \$1.38 for each of the other communities if the supreme court opinion favors the establishment of the Lake Forest high school county tax officials believe.
