Things to Cook

A dessert which is usually a favorite, but which we sometimes forget in our meal planning until it is called to our attention, is Washington Cream Pie, and for that reason I am suggesting it as part of an early menu.

Washington Cream Pie

- 1/2 cup butter
 - 1 cup sugar
 - 2 eggs separated
 - 3/4 cup milk
 - 2 cups sifted cake flour
 - 1/2 teaspoon salt
 - 3 1/2 teaspoons baking powder
 - 1 teaspoon lemon juice
- Cream butter, gradually add sugar and cream well together. Add unbeaten yolks and beat, then alternate milk with flour which has been sifted several times with baking powder and salt. Add flavoring and fold in stiffly beaten egg whites last.

Bake in two layer cake pans in a 375 degree oven about 25 minutes. Place the custard filling between the layers, with a small amount over the top layer. Sprinkle powdered sugar over the top, or serve with whipped cream.

Custard Filling

- 1 1/2 cups milk
- 1/2 tablespoons corn starch
- 1 egg
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla

Scald milk in double boiler, add sugar and corn starch mixed together and cook 15 minutes, stirring constantly until thickened, then occasionally. Add egg slightly beaten and cook about two minutes, remove from fire, add salt and vanilla. Let cool before placing between layers of cake.

Proposals limiting the length of freight trains to 880 yards, abolishing old-tyle wooden cabooses, and compelling railroads to employ an engineer, fireman and qualified fareman on each light train is being considered by the Illinois Commerce commission in Springfield.

These safety measures were sponsored by the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen. The last general assembly asked the commerce commission to investigate the proposals when three bills seeking to make the safety proposals part of the state law were introduced.

Words Often Misused

Do not say, "This is him." Say, "This is he."

Do not say, "What did you do that for?" Say, "Why did you do that?"

Do not say, "I need your help badly." Say, "I need your help very much."

Do not say, "There were less than a hundred men." Say, "fewer than a hundred" to express number.

Do not say, "Australia is a long ways from here." Say, "a long way."

Do not say, "Mrs. Brown is an authoress." Say, "author."

Words Often Mispronounced

Incendiary. Pronounce in-sen-di-ari, all i's as in "it," e as in "men," a as in "day," accent second syllable.

Boatswain. Pronounce bot-swan, o as in "no," a as in "rain," accent first syllable. The nautical pronunciation is bo-s'n.

Diminutive; all i's as in "it," u as in "unit," accent after the n.

Mankind. Accent last syllable, not the first.

Marathon; first a as in "at," second a unstressed, o as in "on," accent first syllable.

Incisive; second i as in "lie," s as in "so," accent second syllable.

Words Often Misspelled

Clause (part of a sentence); claws (nails of an animal.) Ode (a short poem); distinguish from owed. Seccession; three s's, but not sess. Whether (a sheep); distinguish from weather. Cleanly. Note the ea, though pronounced klenly. Oleomargarine; seven vowels.
