Things to Cook

A dessert which is usually a favorite, but which we sometimes forget in our meal planning until it is called 49pd to our attention, is Washington Cream Pie, and for that reason I am suggesting it as part of an early menu.

Washington Cream Pie

1/a cup butter

1 cup sugar

2 eggs separated

% cup milk

2 cups sifted cake flour

1/3 teaspoon salt

31/2 teaspoons baking powder teaspoon lemon juice

Cream butter, gradually add sugar and cream well together. Add unbeaten yolks and beat, then alternate milk with flour which has been sifted several times with baking powder and salt. Add flavoring and fold in stiffly beaten egg whites last.

Bake in two layer cake pans in a 375 degree oven about 25 minutes. Place the custard filling between the layers, with a small amount over the top layer. Sprinkle powdered sugar over the top, or serve with whipped cream.

Custard Filling

11/2 cups milk

1/3 tablespoons corn starch

egg

1/4 teaspoon salt

½ teaspoon vanilla Scald milk in double boiler, add sugar and corn starch mixed together and cook 15 minutes, stirring constantly until thickened, then occasionally. Add egg slightly beaten and good. cook about two minutes, remove from
