There'll be a hot time tonight and tomorrow night at the Minstrel show at the Elm Place school. You won't want to miss it.

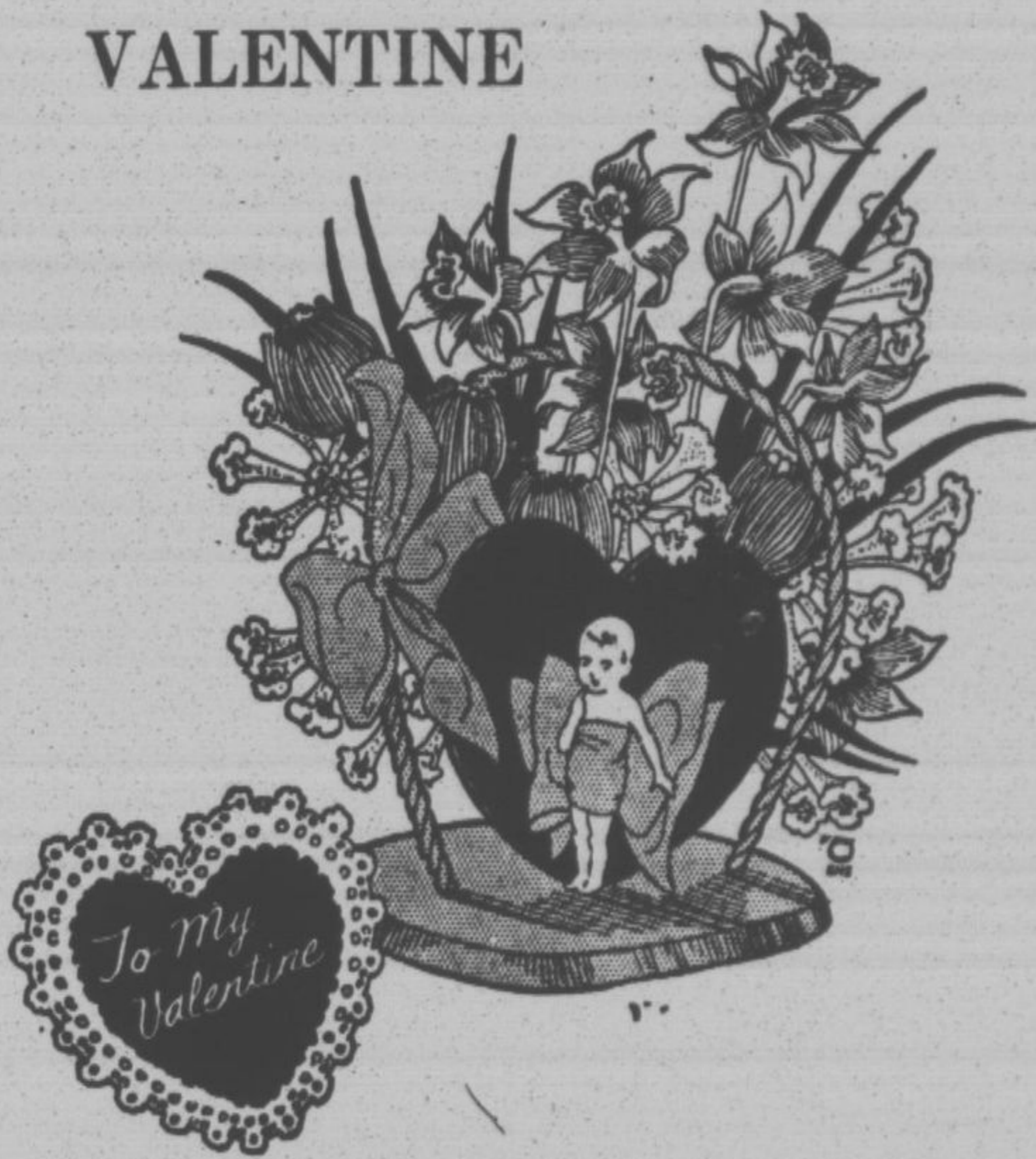
Miss Mary Kollvesto, a resident of Highland Park for the past four years passed away at the home of her parents in Finland, where she was visiting at the time.
