

N. S. SANITARY BOARD DEFERS SEWER ACTION

Controversy With Waukegan City Administration to Await Spring Election

All consideration of the issue pertaining to the installation of a trunk sewer to connect the South Side sewer system with the proposed \$736,000 sewage disposal plant to be erected on the North Flats, north of Waukegan, by the North Shore Sanitary district board will be deferred until the Waukegan city administration to be elected on April 21 takes office. This was decided in a conference between city officials and the sanitary board members last week.

The matter of contention between the city and the sanitary board. The city urged erection of the proposed plant on the south side in order to lessen the cost of this sewer. The sanitary board ignored the objection, however.

Mayor Defines Stand

Mayor L. J. Yager stated the views of the Waukegan city council at the meeting when he declared that it did not care to act on the matter at this late date and believes that as the issue would have to be settled by the incoming council the matter should be left entirely to its approval.

The board discussed tentative sites for the proposed Winthrop Harbor plant. Several sites for the plant are under consideration, it is stated.

Plans for the proposed second plant to be erected on the lake shore in the southern part of Highland Park were also discussed at the meeting. This will be the first plant to be erected of a series of six plants. Work on the Highland Park plant will start early in spring.

Besides the building of the Waukegan, Winthrop Harbor and Highland Park plants, the sanitary board will enlarge plants in Zion, North Chicago and Highwood. These improvements were provided for in the \$1,250,000 bond issue approved at the polls in December.

Man Charged With Swindling Highland Park Resident Caught

Donald Reinhold, who was indicted here in 1928 on the complaint of Louis Berube, of Highland Park, who claimed that he was swindled out of \$18,000, today was brought back from Louisville, Ky., by Sheriff Lester T. Tiffany.

Reinhold had fought extradition unsuccessfully although he forced Tiffany to do close to five days' work to get him back. Tiffany made two trips to Springfield and one to Louisville, and had to send a deputy sheriff to Louisville at one time in order to prevent the man from getting out until he could get the proper papers from the governors of the two states.

Reinhold jumped his bond of \$5,000 in Waukegan more than a year ago when his case was close to the top of the trial call, says a Waukegan paper. Efforts were made several times to trace him but each time the trail ended before police could catch him. Finally he was located in Louisville.

Berube claims that the man, a Chicagoan, represented himself as the agent of two stock companies and sold him \$18,000 in stock that he claims is absolutely worthless.

"Berube was promised a number of things by Reinhold at the time and later he discovered that the representation about the stock had been untrue and that it was worthless instead of being on the verge of developing into a good investment," Assistant States Attorney S. H. Block said.

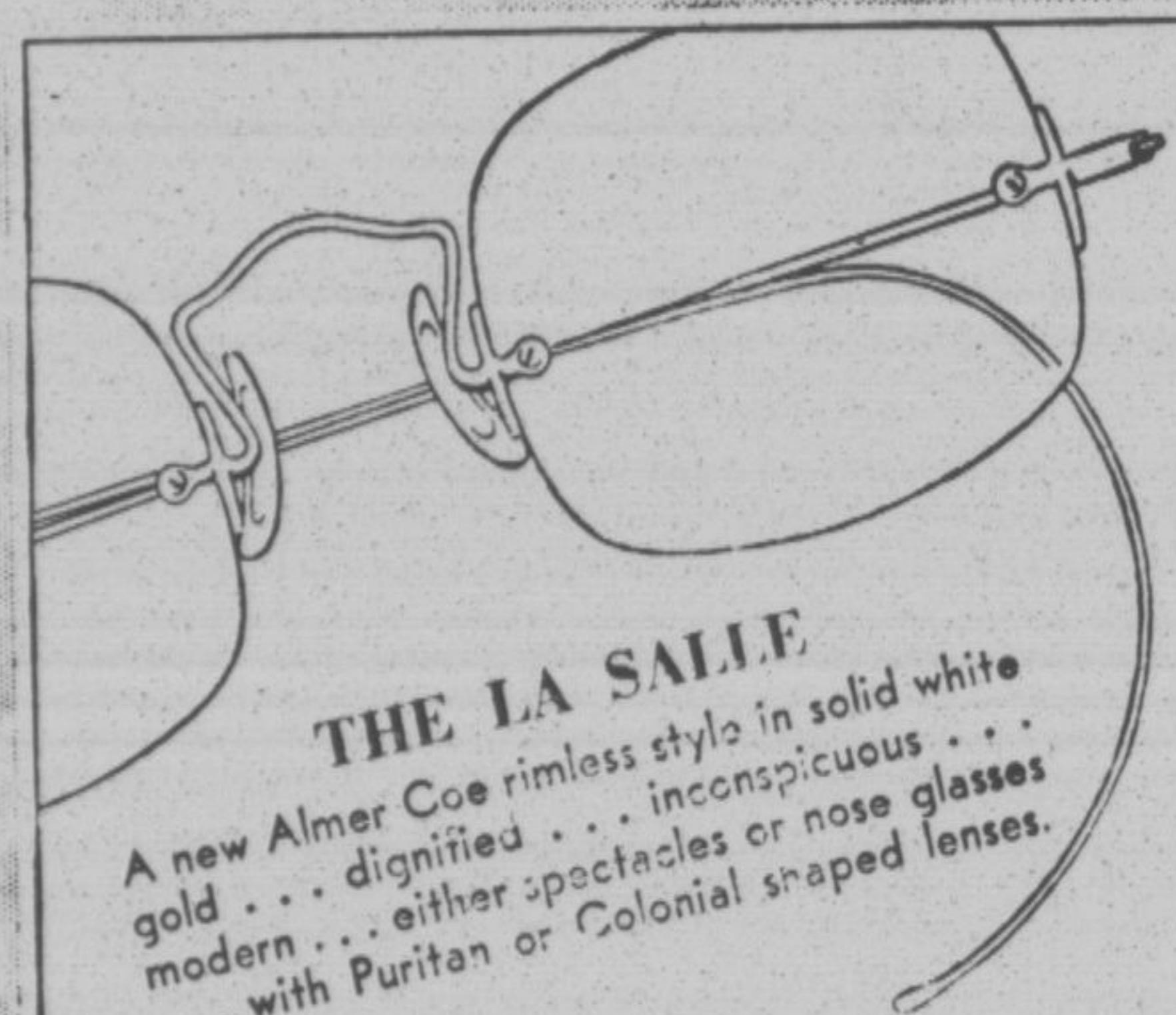
