### Lyons to Urge Changes in Machine Gun Measure

When the senate bill prohibiting the sale, transportation and possession of machine guns comes to the house, Representative Richard J. Lyons of Mundelein will recommend several amendments and changes, he stated last week.

The proposed act as prepared by State's Attorney A. V. Smith and which Lyons was prepared to introduce when Senator A. C. Roberts of Chicago brought before the senate a bill of his own, contains many advantages which the senate bill does not have, Lyons said.

The measure introduced by Lyons in the house, prohibiting the use of open mufflers on outboard motors in the lake region, is scheduled for a hearing before the judiciary committee next Wednesday. The bill aims to reduce the noise and smoke menace from motorboats of which vacationists in the Lake county and other lake regions complain.

### Northwestern Railroad Report; Figures Given

A net income of \$8,324,191 in 1930 is shown by the preliminary report of the Chicago & North Western R.R., after deduction of taxes and charges. This is equivalent after preferred stock obligations have been met to \$4.27 a share on 1,584,389 common shares. It compares with \$8.43 a share in 1929.

Other income showed an increase of \$4,105,203 and deductions from total income were up \$2,574,770, due mostly to the issuance of \$45,000,000 of its own bonds to pay off maturing bonds of Chicago, St. Paul, Minneapolis & Omaha R. R. That road in turn gave North Western a \$45,000,000 note, interest on which is included in other income.
