Funeral Services for L. F. Allardt Held

Mr. Allardt is survived by his widow Mrs. Lillian Steele Allardt, two brothers, Henry Allardt of Chicago and Carl Allardt of South Bend, Ind. and one sister, Mrs. Josephine Rommel of Deerfield.

Mr. Allardt was born in Piqua, Ohio, on May 29, 1865. At the age of 10, with his parents, Rev. and Mrs. J. E. Allardt, he moved to Deerfield. Rev. Allardt was the first pastor of St. Paul's Evangelical church, the pulpit of which he occupied for 16 years. Much of Louis Allardt's early life was spent in Deerfield and he is remembered by the older generation, many of whom were his classmates.
