all workers will be announced that evening at the annual council dinner of the North Shore Area Scouts in the New-Trier high school.

Urge Increased Subscriptions

Mr. Wood emphasized the necessity of contributors increasing their subscriptions to twice as much as the amounts of last year. He explained that half of the total goal of \$50,000 is for the annual maintenance of the scouting program in about 20 towns in the area, while the other \$25,000 is needed to pay off pressing obligations on the scout camp and bring it up to a standard comparable to that of other scout camps. Mr. Wood stated that in Glencoe and Highland Park subscriptions are averaging over twice as much as formerly.

"I am impressed with the favorable response we are meeting on all sides as we solicit for the scouts," Mr. Wood continued. "There are scarcely any refusals. The men who have seen their prospects have produced very, very well."

"However, I am deeply concerned about the slowness of the returns by most of the workers. The publicity and organization have been well-nigh perfect. It is now six days since the opening dinner. The cards are all out in the hands of over 300 good men."

"There is absolutely no doubt about our ability to put this over. We must reach our goal. We can't let the scouts go deeper in the hole. It will be expensive and tiresome to drag it out. Let me urge you, then, to see your cards this week. We ought to finish easily by Tuesday in every town."
