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HAMRIN TO SPEAK AT P. T. A. DINNER MAR. 5

Meeting at 6 p.m. in High School Cafeteria; Much Interest in Program Shown

Widespread interest is being shown by the entire community in the open dinner meeting to be given by the Deerfield-Shields Parent Teacher association, at the high school cafeteria, March 5, at 6 p. m.

CITY PRIMARY IS HELD MARCH 3RD

List of Candidates and Polling Places; City Election Is April 21st

The Highland Park city primary election will be held on Tuesday, March 3, and the annual election will be Tuesday, April 21.

Mayor Benjamin F. Lewis is a candidate for re-election, as are also commissioners W. J. Brown, Lyle Gourley, William M. Reay and Julius Zimmer, subject to the primary election. Other candidates are Emil B. Metzel, for mayor, and for commissioners, Archie B. Cook, Robert J. Greenslade and Joseph H. Taylor.

Under the provisions of the commission form of government act all will be nominated, as the number on the primary ballot does not exceed two for mayor and eight for commissioners.
