

BOY SCOUT ANNUAL BANQUET SUCCESS

Held at New Trier Tuesday Night; Reports Show Fund Drive Nearing Goal

R. Arthur Wood, president of the Chicago Stock Exchange, and chairman of the Central committee of the North Shore Boy Scout campaign announced to nearly 1,000 scout workers and supporters assembled for the annual banquet of the North Shore Area council, Tuesday night at the New Trier high school, that, with a total of \$39,321.00 subscribed, and with an additional \$7,000 expected from the Lake Forest committee soon, victory was in sight.

Several chairmen announced that the campaign workers in their respective towns would need a little more time to finish, and that they would have their quota by the end of the week.

From Lake Forest Chairman

A letter was read from Richard H. Mabbitt, finance chairman of the Lake Forest Scout committee, to Henry Fowler, council president, as follows:

"I am sorry that I will be unable to attend the Boy Scout meeting at the New Trier high school on Tuesday evening, as I have to be out of the city. I just want to advise you that our campaign in Lake Forest is in my estimation, going along satisfactorily. You realize, of course, that we are not running our campaign the same as the other towns in the North Shore Area are, and we will probably not complete it for some weeks yet. However, we feel very sure that Lake Forest will end up with their full share."

Frank Greene Former Resident, Dies; Final Rites Are Held Today

Friends in Highland Park learned with sincere regret of the sudden death of Frank Greene, former well known resident of Highland Park, which occurred suddenly Tuesday at his home in Des Plaines, and the sympathy of the entire community here is extended to his relatives at this time.

Mr. Greene was a resident of Highland Park for many years. For a long time he conducted an ice cream business here and was a familiar figure about the city. The family lived in the building now occupied by the Alden studio, corner of Central avenue and Sheridan road, and Mr. Greene had a candy store in the room now occupied by the office of Murray & Terry.

Mrs. Greene's death occurred here about six years ago and not long afterward Mr. Greene and his son, Lester B. Greene, removed to Des Plaines, where they have since lived. Lester is the only living child.

The funeral service is held at 2 o'clock today, at the family home, 382 Alton street, Des Plaines, and burial will be at Lake Forest. Mr. Greene was a member of the Highland Park Elks lodge for years, and the Elks will have charge of the ceremonies at the cemetery. A number of Highland Park friends of the decedent are planning to attend the final rites.

Fire Chief in Warning Volatile Fluid Hazard

In spite of wide publicity regarding the danger to life and property, housewives will use gasoline, benzine and other inflammable cleaning fluids in closed rooms with unguarded lights and stoves in the vicinity.

The housewife must remember that on all gas stoves there is a small pilot lighter that has a small flame which is continuously burning. This is true of automatic water heaters and oil burning appliances. Even without the fire being present there is danger especially with gasoline, from a static by friction of fluid on cloth. If you must use gasoline, benzine or other inflammable fluids for cleaning, use them only in the open air and in the daylight and not near to any open light or flame.

The season of house cleaning is approaching and many housewives will undertake to use gasoline for cleaning purposes and may become careless in its use. Many accidents and possible fatalities can be avoided. My advice to all housewives is to have their cleaning of cloth rugs, etc., done by cleaners who are experienced in this work.
