Jacob L. Crane, Chicago City Planner on Trip to China and Russia

Jacob L. Crane, Jr., city planner, left Chicago February 24 on a trip to China for consultation work there on the city planning of Canton and also on a new seaport and townsite. This latter project is one item in the program for the development of China as outlined ten years ago by Dr. Sun Yat Sen, first president of the Chinese Republic. In spite of civil warfare the nationalism government in China is carrying out a huge list of improvements,—highways, railways, bridges, harbors, airways, and land reclamation.

From China Crane proceeds to Russia where Soviet authorities have invited him to come and advise on technical policies connected with city planning and state planning. Several new cities are being laid out and built in Russia, and the Supreme Economic council there has control over state planning, city planning, and rural planning, which are being prosecuted

vigorously in co-ordination with the five year plan. As with industrial production itself, the Soviets are desirous of adopting the best American city planning and city building principles.

On his way home from Moscow Crane will be a delegate to the International City Planning congress in Berlin the first of June.

Crane sails from Vancouver February 28 on Canadian Pacific steamer Empress of Japan and on his way to China will spend a few days with city planning and real estate authorities in Tokio.
