### Old Northfield Evangelical Church Being Torn Down

The Northfield Evangelical Church association, called (the Au Plain and O'Plain church) is being torn down. It was erected in 1880 by a contractor from Barrington, on land given by John Stryker, an uncle of John and Fred Stryker of Deerfield. Mr. Stryker's farm was at the southwest corner of the intersection of Dundee and Saunders road, and he gave an acre right at the corner. Several years ago the land was bought by Mr. Van Duersen, but it now has reverted to the Stryker heirs because of legal technicalities.

The original sight of the Evangelical Association church was across the street on the northwest corner, where there was a small cemetery behind the church. There are still bodies in this cemetery. The first church was a crude log one, built in 1847. It was the first Evangelical church in Illinois and as the community grew it came to have over three hundred members, (the largest in Illinois at that time). Many state conferences were held within its portals, and it has the distinction of having the first conference for the state.

A Chicago contractor is wrecking this once proud and stately building which has stood idle since 1893, when there was a split in Evangelical churches, some members remaining with the Evangelical association and others going into the United Evangelical faction. The timbers in this building cannot be duplicated today. In those days they knew nothing of Insulex and Celotex, but they knew how to insulate in their own way. It is double sheeted inside and out and its sturdy frame, after all these thirty-five years of idleness, show skilled workmanship in its construction.

The beautiful black walnut pulpit and pulpit chairs, the organ, and many of the beautiful pews are now in the home of the artists, Mr. and Mrs. Bert Lynn Davis of Saunders road, who bought the former Ormon Rockenbach barn and remodeled it into a very attractive studio home.

The passing of this Northfield church is the fourth landmark to disappear this spring. The other three are the Schar log cabin, the Duffy tavern and the old pickle factory.

#### By-Laws

1. The name of this organization shall be Deerfield Civic Organization.

2. Membership of this organization shall consist of members of all organizations and citizens of Deerfield.

3. The executive body of this organization shall consist of one representative of each participating organization and ward present. Some to be elected annually.

4. The Deerfield Civic organization shall be non-partisan.

5. The executive committee shall pass upon the fitness of candidates for municipal offices and recommend same for approval or disapproval of the organization and other voters of Deerfield.

6. The Deerfield Civic organization shall meet at least once a year. Additional meetings may be called by the executive board whenever necessary.
