## H. P. TO GET FEDERAL BUILDING IS BELIEF

**Next Congress to Make Appropriation; Recommendation Is Made; Others**

That the next session of congress probably will make an initial appropriation of \$150,000 for a post office building site and preliminary work in Highland Park is indicated in the following telegram received this week from Senator Otis Glenn, Washington D. C.:

"Treasury and post office departments have submitted to congress for action next session recommendation of \$150,000 appropriation for new federal building construction at Highland Park. I congratulate your community on this important progress, and as member of treasury and post office sub-committee of the senate appropriations committee, I shall put forth every effort to secure early passage of the Highland Park project.

### Five Others

Five postoffice building projects for Lake county towns, involving a total of \$525,000 are the prospect for next year, according to the announcement of the post office department made before congress.

Authorization for the expenditure of \$38,890,000 for federal buildings in Illinois will be asked of congress next year and the amount includes fund for Highland Park, North Chicago, Libertyville, Barrington and Zion.

## H. P. Rotary Club Has International Feature in Program on Monday

The Highland Park Rotary club enjoyed an exceptionally interesting program at its weekly luncheon session Monday noon, at the Moraine hotel, with Chairman Marshall Johnson of the International Relations committee in charge.

Sometime ago the club sent letters containing miniature silk American flags to Rotary clubs in 6 foreign countries, and 16 replies had been received. These were read. Many of them were in English, and those which were not had been translated by foreign language students at the high school.

The letters were from the following places and countries: Algeria, Gras, Austria; Liege, Belgium; Peking, China; Tallinn, Esthonia; Leipzig, Germany; Athens, Greece; Lahore, India; Londonderry, Ireland; Trieste, Italy; Luxembourg, Casablanca, Morocco; St. Johns, Newfoundland; Timiscara, Roumania; East London, Union of South Africa; Novi Sad, Jugoslavia.

Mr. R. C. Platt, head of the Latin department of the high school, spoke interestingly on "The International Aspect of the Rhodes Scholarships." Mr. Platt is himself a Rhodes scholar and his explanation was instructive and illuminating. He was introduced by Principal R. L. Sandwick, who spoke briefly.
