PARK ACTIVITIES ARE BEING PLANNED

Playgrounds and Beaches Will Offer Increased Attractions; Feature Sports

The Park Board recreational activities have developed from a small beginning six years ago to one of importance in the community and rendered more than 120,000 individual services last year.

This work has been built up on a sound basis that assure its continuance for all time by reason of its being part of the work and duty to the public by a municipal organization that is elected by the citizens of the district and from whom the funds expended are derived.

To complete the facilities for serving the need of the public one thing is lacking that is generally provided by park boards—a building centrally located and provided with facilities for recreation so that activities may be carried on during the whole of the year.

Every community is composed of several or many groups who must be provided and cared for separately. Some of these groups require more attention and service because of their isolation or lack in family or home influence. It is this group that would receive the most benefit and service while the occupation of their leisure time would have a materially beneficial effect on the welfare of the community.
