How Composed

The council is composed of the four presidents of the Lake county leagues; four representatives appointed by the presidents, and four committee chairmen serving temporarily according to the business in hand. There regular meetings will be held during each year, in order to co-ordinate the work of the four leagues. County institutions will be studied, and candidates' records secured. A conference with the senator and representatives from this district has been planned.

Principal Sandwick Tells N.E.A. Meeting, Detroit

"Working together for the children of America," was the subject title or theme of the convention of the department of superintendents of the National Educational association, which Principal Sandwick of Deerfield-Shields attended last week. The convention was held at Detroit, Michigan, from Feb. 21 to 26 inclusive. About 5,000 superintendents and principals from various parts of the country were in attendance.

One of the most interesting addresses, according to Mr. Sandwick, was one given by Admiral Byrd, last Monday evening. The subject of his talk was, "Conquering the Arctic by Air."

Popularity of Auburn Automobile Increasing

Retail sales of Auburn and Cord cars at the recent Los Angeles show was equal to the total sales of the company at Los Angeles Automobile shows for the last six years, N. E. McDarby, vice president in charge of sales for Auburn, announced today.

At the San Francisco show Auburn retail sales hit a new high record, McDarby said.

The Auburn executive has just ended a coast-to-coast trip in which he attended 14 automobile shows, and covered approximately 6000 miles.

"Acceptance of the new Auburn line is greatly beyond anything we anticipated," he said. "Unfilled orders continue to grow rather than to diminish, although every effort is being exerted to bring production up to a point that will relieve the situation. Addition of the extra manufacturing facilities at our Auburn, Indiana plant, which will be available early in March, will give us approximately 2000 cars more monthly."

Auburn Automobile company has added 185 new dealers since Jan. 1, Mr. McDarby announced. Additional dealers are being added at the rate of four a day, the Auburn executive said.

The company's dealer organization is now 15 per cent greater than at any previous time in its history, McDarby pointed out.

The new dealers being signed, McDarby said, are practically all experienced operators, well financed and with good locations.

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
