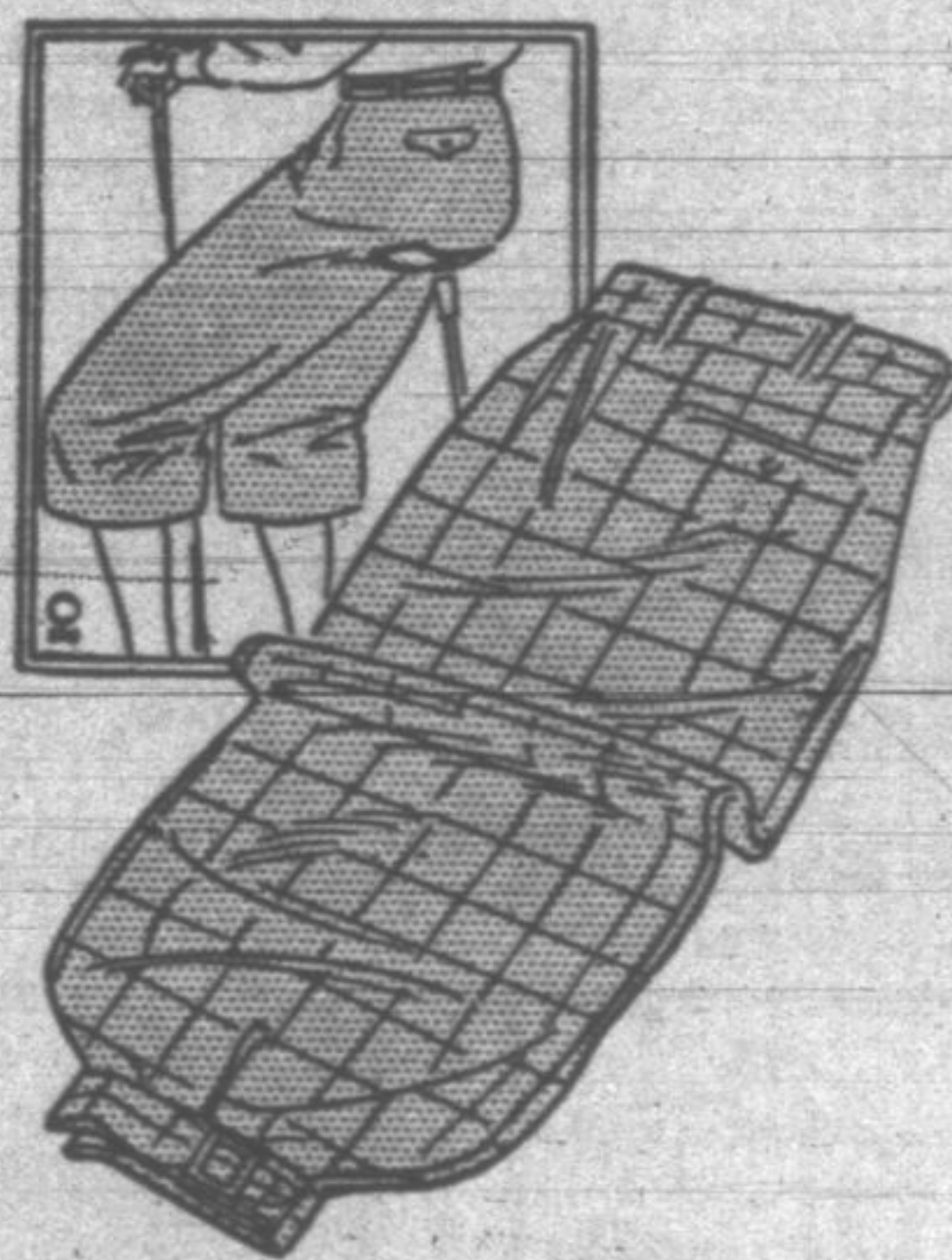
Mr. and Mrs. John O'Keefe are enjoying a delightful vacation in Los Angeles, Calif. They expect to return home about March 10th.
