## COMMUNITY MOURNS OLD SETTLER'S DEATH

### Eliza Jane Shepard Wilson, Well Known Resident Passes on; Funeral February 21

Not only the communities of Libertyville and Deerfield, but the entire Chicago area, upon whose development has been left the impress of a long life of service, loyalty, and affection, share the deep sorrow occasioned by the loss of one of its dearly loved pioneers.

The memory of Mrs. Eliza Jane Shepherd Wilson will be perpetuated, not alone in the hearts of those who loved her, but in the annals of the history of this territory.

The intensely interesting story of her life, and of the growth and development of Chicago and our surrounding suburbs, is to be found in the History of Deerfield. Mrs. Wilson's superior mind and memory, with her keen insight into personalities and her sympathy with and understanding of human nature, make her accounts of by-gone days veritable records of the pulsing, throbbing lives which have built our communities. No small share was hers. For "Jennie" Shepherd taught in the schools, took an active part in the church and other organizations, reared a family of staunch and true citizens, and was ready at all times to use her gifts for the benefit of others.
