LEAGUE OF WOMEN VOTERS ACTIVITIES

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Decatur, "if for no other reason that we should have, as has been pointed out, some way of measuring the actual cost of production. Thousands of women in the United States depend upon electric power in operating their homes. In the main they are at the mercy of the privately owned corporation serving them. They pay the price demanded and have no come back because they have no standard of production.

"If electric power can be furnished to the housewives of Muscle Shoals district at 2 cents per kilowatt hour it can be furnished in other districts for much less than what is now being charged. I think it is only good housekeeping business that the women demand of the Federal Govern-

ment action calculated to justify all the millions of dollars that have been spent at Muscle Shoals."

Question Uppermost

The question uppermost in Mrs. Wagenseller's mind, and in that of all those interested in Muscle Shoals is, "will the President sign the measure or veto it?"

The resolution as now adopted by both Houses of Congress provides for the leasing of the nitrate plants and for the government operation of the power plants. However, the lessee is allowed all the power needed for the production of fertilizer on the spot plus 15 per cent additional power which he may use for other purposes outside of Muscle Shoals. The government is authorized to dispose of all surplus power giving preference to states and municipalities and may build trunk transmission lines for this purpose. In the event a lessee for the nitrate plants is not found at the end of 12 months, the government then takes over the operation of those plants.
