Author of "Sinister Shadows"
Talks on Menace of Communism; Details

Following the regular meeting of the H. P. Chamber of Commerce Tuesday evening at the Green Tea Pot where dinner was served at 6:30, members present repaired to the Elm Place auditorium, where Col. E. M. Hadley, author of "Sinister Shadows," delivered a very interesting and at times startling talk on the menace of communism in America during the past few years.

The commissioners are elected bi-ennially for a term of six years.

Mr. Hardacre has been a commissioner for seven years and Mr. Udell has been in office for one year having been elected to fill a vacancy caused by Mr. Rigdon's resignation.
