RAVINIA VARIETIES AGAIN FRIDAY NIGHT

Gala Performance To Be Given
By Request; First Two Are
Great Success

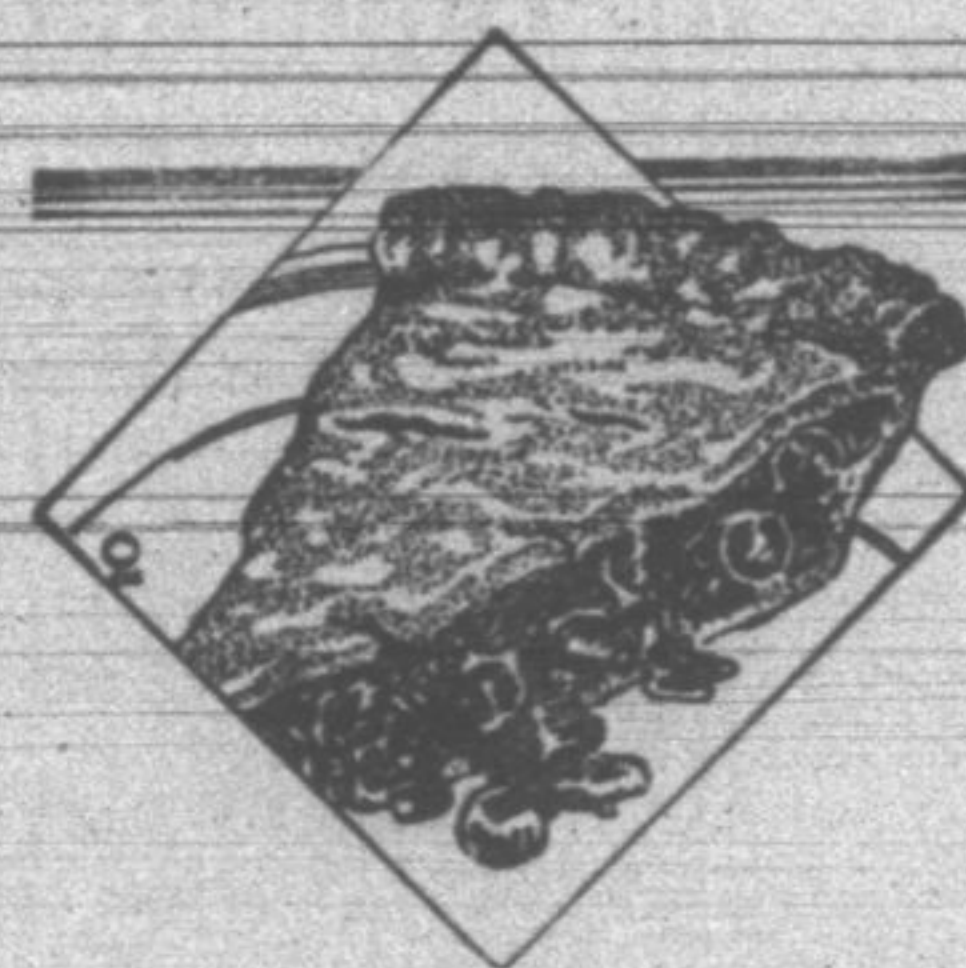

Lincoln School Boxing Class Making Progress

The members of the Saturday morning boxing class, promoted by Community Service at Lincoln School gymnasium, are making good progress in acquiring the "Manly art of self defense" and now are given short practice bouts which are confined to the use of the basic points of attack and defense taught in the early part of each lesson period.

While it is acknowledged that no other form of competitive sport provides the all-around physical exercise gained in boxing, it is also felt that its greatest value is a mental one. Boxing creates a feeling of self confidence and well being and greatly builds up co-ordination of both the physical and mental faculties. It promotes good sportsmanship and fair dealing and is a good stimulus to clean living.
