

### MOVE TO HAVE STATE SHARE COUNTY COSTS

#### Effort to Be Made to Have Salaries of Officials Paid In This Way

Effort on the part of the county board of supervisors to have the state take over the burden of \$29,400 of its payroll will be made during the present session of the board of which began Tuesday, March 10, it is reported from Waukegan. The Times of that city says:

Of the amount that the county will ask the state to take over \$17,100 would be in actual salaries and \$12,300 in pensions for mothers and the blind.

The counties throughout the state are not receiving enough to operate adequately, according to supervisors. On the other hand the state legislature will not consider raising the tax rate. The only relief would be for the state to assume a portion of the burden.

#### Bill in Legislature

The resolution, which will be passed by all counties in the state, will be rushed to the general assembly as soon as possible as there is a bill pending there espousing such relief.

The state will be asked to assume the payments of the probate judge's salary of \$5,000 the county judge of \$6,000 and the state's attorney of \$6,100. State's Attorney A. V. Smith actually receives \$6,500 now, but the state has been paying \$4000 of this, so the request would be for \$6,100 more.

The blind aid paid last year was \$14,600, of which the state paid half, and the appropriation for mother's pension now is \$10,000, of which the state would pay half. The resolution asks that the state pay all of this.

#### Some Paid by State

As some of the county officers now receive their pay from the state, the board members are of the opinion that it all could be handled through the same source in a more economical and satisfactory manner.

At first the office of State's Attorney Smith was not included as it had been self supporting since he took it over nine years ago. This brought the opinion that it was a fee office, or one that had to operate on an income from raids and services, but it was found that this was not a fact.

When he tied the score at 20-20 with 40 seconds to play, a shot from the middle of the floor sent Deerfield fans into wild enthusiasm.

On the defense "Punch" Atteridge was everywhere, even taking the ball from Waukegan on their half of the floor. Paley, playing his usual excellent game, saved Deerfield several baskets by recovering shots off the backboard and blocking jump-in shots.

Clarence L. Brown, youthful attorney, swept aside M. J. Haney, the present incumbent, and won the G. O. P. nomination for police magistrate in Waukegan, in a spectacular harvest of votes in last week's primary in Waukegan. The total unofficial vote gave Brown 4,370 and Haney 3,346.

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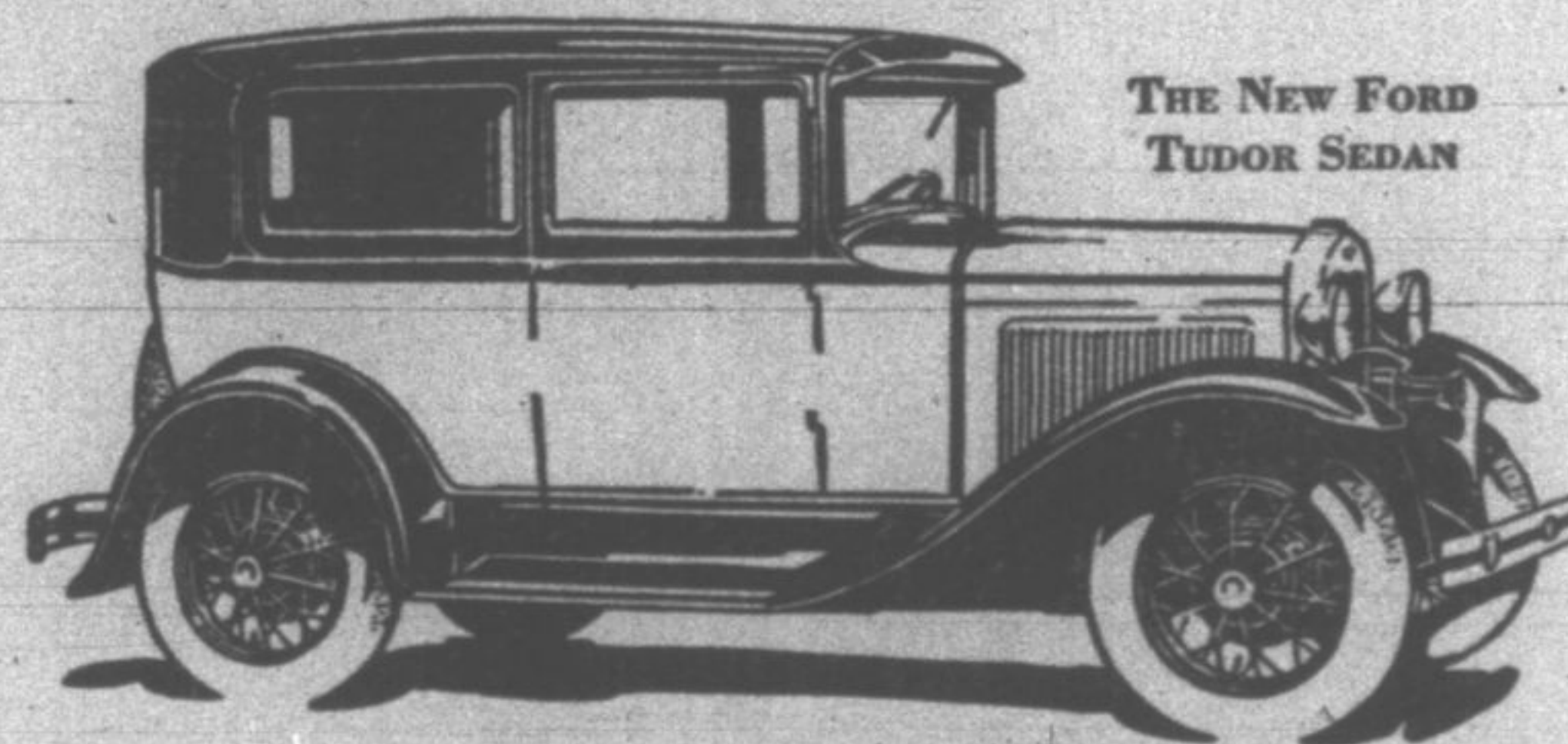
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
