WOMAN'S CLUB IS ORGANIZED MAR. 4

Mrs. Walter Metcalf, Temporary President; First Meeting March 24th

Last Wednesday afternoon twelve women, a representative group of all the local churches and organizations of Deerfield met in the Boy Scout room of the Citizens State bank building for the purpose of discussing the feasibility of organizing a Deerfield Woman's club.

Mrs. Lyle Gourley, president of the Lake County Federation of Women's clubs, and Mrs. W. M. Frye, one of the officers of the Lake Forest Woman's club, were the speakers.

Mrs. Gourley spoke of the object and purpose of a club and the possibilities of such an organization. She read some of the yearly programs of other small clubs in Lake county and told of the fine speakers which could be secured, giving a list lengthy enough to serve the club for two years.

After her speech she called for a general discussion into which all present entered. It was voted unanimously to organize a Woman's club, having a very simple program as a beginning.

The first meeting is to be held on Tuesday afternoon, March 24, at the Deerfield public library and thereafter will meet the second and fourth Tuesday afternoons of each month. The last meeting is to be held in May with no meetings during the summer months, but revived again in the fall when the membership is expected to be increased.

Officers for the coming year will be elected at the first meeting. The temporary officers elected at last Wednesday's meeting were: president, Mrs. Walter Metcalf; secretary, Mrs. D. E. Wageck.

The committee elected to draft the by-laws has Mrs. C. C. Kapschull as chairman and Miss Irene Rockenbach and Mrs. Irving Brand as the other two members.

Deerfield has twenty-six women who are on the roster of the Highland Park Woman's club year book for 1930-31. There are also two life members.

Deerfield Garden Club to Meet Wednesday

DEERFIELD ORGANIZES CIVIC ASSOCIATION

To Sponsor Municipal Advantages for Village; Club and Churches Represented

On last Wednesday evening preliminary steps were taken for the organization of a Deerfield Civic association. Representatives of fifteen of Deerfield's clubs, churches and other organizations met and formed the nucleus of the civic association. Membership will be open to all residents of the community and will be a medium for the expression and discussion of civic betterment of citizenry. All questions of government will receive consideration.

No Political Motive

The association is not organized for political motives, and will not name candidates for office; but will vote upon those signifying their intentions to run for office. If 50 per cent of the ballots of the members agree that the candidate is worthy, he will be recommended, but if he does not receive 50 per cent of the ballots, he will not be recommended.

The precise privileges and duties of the civic association will be detailed at the next meeting which will be held on Wednesday evening, April 1, when by-laws will be adopted and officers installed. It is to be non-partisan with an election of officers annually.

Object of Association

Every community has natural advantages and the object of the civic association will be to sponsor the natural advantages of Deerfield, such as public improvements, public parks, municipal golf course, etc., when the time comes for such things.

It is impossible to get some of the best talent to hold political offices, because many do not care for the political embarrassment which follows such political fights. The organization plans to eliminate this and to stand back of the candidates they endorse and give them confidence. The association feels that this will stimulate more material that will be available for public positions.

Marshall Pottenger, president of the Deerfield Lions, is temporary chairman of the Civic association.
