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upon the relationships between the parents themselves. Those who have never learned the beautiful and difficult art of living together joyously as man and wife can scarcely expect their children to make satisfying social adjustments.

"The deeper and vital factors of family life have changed far less than have its superficial aspects, during the past generation. The chief differences have resulted from the sad fact that mothers and children, emancipated from heavy toil by modern inventions, have found no profitable way to employ the time and energy thus released. A sincere search must be made for worthy forms of creative activity.

"Eugenics and voluntary parenthood cannot, today, be omitted from a consideration of child welfare. When we consider the mating of our children with the degree of intelligence used by the stock raiser in the mating of his horses, dogs and cattle, we will have made a long step toward realizing that civilization of which we boast.

Mental Soundness

"Mental soundness, for adults, comes only when one has grown up physically; and if we do not permit our children (even very young ones) to make decisions for themselves, and then experience the results of those decisions, they will never grow into the full stature of men and women. Overweening and ill-judged solicitude (usually on the part of the mother) and too much 'bending of the twig,' have ruined countless lives.

"Children are people, each having unique powers and possibilities and each needing more sympathetic understanding and co-operation and less interference with its development; needing less instruction about the values of things and more about the basic value of life.

Outside Training

"Much of the training of older children is now obtained outside of the home and school, so we must give attention, not merely to the kind of teachers who are directing them, but to the movies, radio, magazines and books which are molding their lives.

"The condition of the handicapped child is now receiving a reasonable degree of attention, but little is being done to assist and direct the superior children, from whose ranks the leaders of the world, fifty years hence, will come. This is one of the largest problems now facing parents and teachers.

"In the last analysis, children will do as we do, rather than as we say, and the safest way to lead them to the realization of their highest possibilities is to make ourselves, now, the kind of people we hope they will grow up to be."

ing of their children. The slant of one's life, his emotional background, his enduring attitudes and tastes are determined by the time he is eight years old. The finest personalities should be employed as his teachers in these magic years. High school days and college semesters are less influential in making or breaking a youth than are these threshold moments that pass so quickly beyond reach forever."

In his talk, "What Ails Our Youth?" he asks these searching questions: "Are our boys and girls going to destruction? How shall we interest boys and girls in religion? Has the church lost out with youth? Do our youth have ideals? What do they believe? Are we to blame for what youth is? Shall we despair? What hope and faith may we have in the boys and girls of our time? Are we adults blind and out of date or is there reason to be alarmed over conditions in home, school and society?"

Gives High Praise
