Ton of Mud Each Day from Water for City

So far there has not been a single day this month when the water in Lake Michigan has not been muddy. Expressed in chemical terms the turbidity of the raw water at the pumping station has ranged from 80 to Brigham, 250 East Central avenue at 310 parts per million. This means H. P. Music Club Plans that the water has contained from about 670 to 2600 pounds of dirt per million gallons.

> Last week-following the storm of March 7th-the average was unusually high. During that period the filter plant removed nearly twelve tons of dirt from the water which was pumped to town. Are we glad we have our new filter plant? We are!
