### Richard Neutra Speaks at Art Luncheon Mar. 22 Ravinia Village House

The Arts committee of the Ravinia Woman's club is giving a tea in the Music Room of the Village House on Sunday, March 22, at 4 o'clock. The guest of honor will be Richard J. Neutra who will talk about "The New Architecture."

Richard J. Neutra, internationally noted architect, has just completed a lecture tour around the globe. Last spring he followed an invitation to speak before architects, university students and art associations in Tokyo and Osaka, Japan. He traveled through China, southern Asia, North Africa and Europe, and spoke to large audiences in Belgium, Germany, Switzerland, Czecho Slovakia, Austria. These lectures were widely reported and discussed by the leading newspapers. After his return to America, Mr. Neutra spoke in New York, for the New School of Social Research, the Roerich museum, the Art Center and the American Union of Designers.

Among his outstanding designs and work in this country are his projects for "Rush City" including air ports, railroad terminals, business centers, schools, etc., all treated in a fundamentally progressive manner; his Garden Apartments in Hollywood, published and republished in magazines and books the world round, an his All-Steel and Shot Concrete residence in Hollywood, overhanging a suspended swimming tank, with open air theater, gymnastic courts, etc., which this summer in Paris was celebrated as America's contribution to the world movement in new architecture.

### MRS. GREENBERG IN LEAGUE RADIO TALK

#### H. P. Woman Speaks Over Station WGN on "Larger School Unit"; Her Talk

Mrs. Ira Greenberg, chairman of education for the Highland Park League of Women Voters is to address the Lake Bluff League on March 25. Her subject will be "The Status of Education in Illinois." Mrs. Greenberg recently spoke over WGN on a State League program, discussing the larger school unit. Her talk follows:

#### The Large School Unit

The Illinois League of Women Voters wishes to enlist the attention of the Illinois electorate to a deplorable condition obtaining in the state common school system; and, to recommend the adoption of a bill proposing to remedy that condition. The proposed bill is sponsored by the Illinois Joint Committee on Educational Legislation, an organization representing the opinions of numerous social and public welfare agencies whose aggregate membership approximate 100,000.

Illinois has 12,000 school districts. Within these districts are over 10,000 one-room rural schools. The number of pupils in daily attendance in these schools ranges from 4 to 15. The training standards of the teachers are low, and their compensation is correspondingly low, the yearly incomes averaging \$655 in Hardin county, for example. Barely seven months are devoted to learning the rudiments of the 3 R's, and most of what is learned is forgotten in the enforced five months vacation. The quarters housing the instructor and her young charges are often mere
