Few of the churchgoers who filled Trinity Episcopal church last Sunday and heard the mello voice of the soloist, realized that they were listening to a former Highland Park boy who sang in the same church choir when a youth 45 years ago.

Mr. Kenneth P. Boulton of Beaumont, Calif., is a grandson of Richard T. Street who came with his family to Highland Park in the late '70's. The aged records of Trinity church show that Mr. Street was a vestryman in the old church. His grandson Kenneth Boulton in the 80's was one of the choir boys who then, as today, each Sunday lift their voices in songs of worship.

Mr. Boulton returned to Highland Park last week to attend the burial of his mother, Mrs. George D. Boulton, and expressed the wish at that time to sing once more in the choir of his youth. Last Sunday, unbeknown to most of the churchgoers, he took his place in the choir again, adding his voice to the thirty-five voices of the choir. He also sang a special solo.

Mr. Kenneth P. Boulton left Highland Park about 20 years ago for Beaumont, Calif., where he has made his home, but he still feels an unforgettable attachment for the home of his youth.
