**Miss Goddard's Play  
Evenings Are Enjoyed**

The children of Lincoln school and their parents have been enjoying a series of play-evenings within the past three months, the pupils as performers and the parents as spectators, under the direction of Miss Ethel Goddard, well-known director of physical training.

The purpose of these exhibitions was that the patrons of the school might become better acquainted with the different types of activity engaged in by the children during their daily recreational period, and the method and manner of instruction.

Because of limited space for spectators, but two grades played each evening: January 27, grades four and five; February 16, grades six and seven, and March 16, grades two and three. The work consisted of group and team games, stunts, and folk dancing and singing games in the lower grades. Some of the work in the upper grades was under pupil leadership.

The work as a whole showed fine results of carefully organized and directed games suitable to children of various ages, and aroused genuine interest and enthusiasm among the many parents present on each occasion. Such work combines physical training and development with character-building and the cultivation of the spirit of common justice, fair play and co-operation. Miss Goddard established her work in this community over thirteen years ago, and there is an increasing appreciation on the part of the parents of her work and worth.
