**Charles Fiore Home From Trip Abroad; Tells of His Tour**

Charles Fiore has returned from a trip abroad during which he visited his mother and relatives and he surely was pleased to see them all again. While there he made a thorough tour of the most important places in France and Italy. He visited the art galleries famous in Rome and Naples and studied the well-known gardens surrounding these cities, including the Vatican, where he had an opportunity to speak a few words with Pope Pius V. The garden of the Vatican, he declared, is a masterpiece in landscaping. He made quite a study of the Villa Desta, which was built in the 12th century. Some of the cypress trees in this garden were planted over a thousand years ago. This particular Villa boasts of 600 fountains, over 400 of which are still operating. From Rome Mr. Fiore went to Florence where he described the beautiful suburbs and stressed art exhibits there which are combined so beautifully with the landscape work. This sold him on the idea of importing numbers of fountains and statuary for our American gardens and these masterpieces may soon be seen at his nursery.

From Florence he went to Pisa and viewed the leaning tower of Pisa which he says is of unbelievable construction at an angle of 45°. He started to climb the tower but was afraid to go to the top. However, Mr. Lloyd Sheahan, one of his companions on this tour, succeeded in reaching the top and was rewarded.
